But, not to worry, I won't walk out if I attend a chapel service where there is the inclusive language or the type of instruction mentioned above given for the service.

would be my choice to attend the service that day. When I choose to attend go to pick out the number of times the leader uses a sex indicating term. that is their choice, so be it. I will abide by that. I would only hope that others would offer this same kindness to me when I lead a service.
