PROFESSOR BRICKER TO BE INAUGRATED AS LIBRARIAN

The Rev. George H. Bricker will be inaugurated as librarian and Professor of Theology at 7:30 p.m., Wednesday, Nov. 4. The service will be part of the Annual Convocation.

A graduate of Franklin and Marshall College and of Lancaster Seminary, he has also earned the M.Ed. degree at the university of Pittsburgh and is a candidate for the degree of Master of Library Science at the Drexel Institute of Technologhy, Philadelphia. The degree will be awarded in the spring of 1960. In addition, he has done graduate work in theology at Temple University. Before coming to the Seminary he served pastorates in Johnstown, Waynesboro, and Lancaster.

The title of Professor Bricker's in - augural address will be "The Place of the Library in Theological Education." a reception will follow the inauguration.

CORPORATION PRESIDENT DIES

H. Wilson Lark, a member of the Corporation of the seminary since 1934 and president since 1947, died Oct. 6, after an illness of four weeks. He was 78.

A successful businessman in his hometown, Shamokin, and surrounding area, he was active in industrial, political, and benevolent affairs, as well as a staunch supporter of Church affairs. He was a member of St. John's Evangelical and Reformed Church, Shamokin.

Surviving are three sons and three daughters, two brothers and 16 grand-children.

NILES, MUILENBURG, FACKRE ARE CONVOCATION SPEAKERS

Dr. Daniel T. Niles, Dr. James Muilenburg, and Gabriel Fackre will present addresses at the Annual Convocation Wednesday and Thursday, November 4 and 5.

"The Mood of the Gospel" will be the theme of Dr. Niles' sermon on Thursday. Dr. Niles, the Convocation Preacher, is currently the Harry Emerson Fosdick visiting Professor at Union Theological Seminary.

As Swander Lecturer, Dr. Muilenburg will speak on these themes. On Wed., "Major Themes of Bibical Faith; Father and Son"; on Thursday, "Redeemer and Redeemed" and "King and Servant". A Congregational Christian, Dr. Mulienburg is a faculty member at Union Theological Seminary.

Mr. Fackre, a Ph.D. Candidate at the University of Chicago Divinity School, will present the McCauley Lectures. On Wednesday, he will discuss "Mill Town People and Their Problems"; on Thursday, "Giving Joe Doe a Name and a Face". Mr. Fackre has been working to establish an area similar to the Iona Community at Milleron Community.

IN MEMORY OF H. WILSON LARK

A man who for 25 years took a vital interest in the welfare of our seminary died two weeks ago, following an illness brought on by a heart attack. He was H. Wilson Lark, president of the semi-nary corporation

Our upper classmen will recall Mr. Lark as a gentleman of short stature and halting but deliberate gestures. He wore a soft smile and spoke gently.

Annually, since he was elected president of the corporation, he gave an address at graduation exercises of the seminary. It was right that on such occasions a layman as well as clergymen and professors should be heard.

When that occasion came around last spring, Mister Lark was Doctor Lark; a year earlier he had been awarded an honorary doctor of laws degree by Franklin and Marshall College. This honor from the Board of Trustees of the college was a fitting recognition for one who had given so generously of his energy and wealth to the Evangelical and Reformed Church and other institutions.

He was a member of St. John's E &R Church in Shamokin and for many years served as a consistoryman there. He served on many synodical committees and several times was a delegate to General Synod, where he freely participated in the proceedings.

He was a director and vice president of the Bethany Children's Home of the E & R Church and for 28 years was a trustee of the Shamokin State Hospital.

His success in the business and industrial field permitted him to give considerable financial support to his interests. He was president of the National Dime Bank and owned and operated Steam Coals, Inc., both of Shamokin, and the Wilson Coal Co. and Penag Coal Co., both in Schuykill County.

He was a man short in stature, but tall in service, dedication, and loyalty to Christ and his fellowmen

THE ALTAR By John Lindner

"Will you pray?" That question is asked of many: those who eat their meals together, those at meetings, and those in many other situations. What is our reaction to this question?

When we are asked to lead in prayer, do we shirk the request? Do we consider praying something at which we are not skillful enough? Maybe we are not in the practice of parying aloud in public. Or, maybe we are too lazy spiritually to put our inner feelings into speech.

Maybe we are the kind of persons who like to be coaxed into offering the prayer—but we say it is humility. We do not feel worthy; we are no better than others. But if we are coaxed, we accept. And in the meantime, we have gained some extra attention, haven't we? Are we sure that our sense of humilty is not really pride in a false sense of humilty?

"Will you pray?" Indeed, that is a privilege to be taken "with all lowliness and meekness". But that does not mean with no willingness or confidence. Obedient we should be, to pray in the Name of our Lord. Self-centeredness must give way to selflessness, but a selflessness that has its confidence in Christ.

Prayer: Our Father, who art an ever present help, help us to pray at all times in thy Spirit, with true supplication. To that end, keep us alert with all perseverance to make supplication for all of Thy people, and also for ourselves, that utterance may be given us in opening our mouths boldly to proclaim the mystery of the gospel, for which we are ambassadors in chains. In Jesus' Name. Amen.
