## SEMINARY HOSTS AAUW HOLLY BAZAAR



The American Association of University Women, Lancaster Branch, is sponsoring the 1993 Holly Bazaar at Lancaster Seminary on Saturday, December 4, and Sunday, December 5, from 12:00 noon to 6:00 p.m. No tickets are required to attend the bazaar, which features crafts, foods and books. ## EXTENSION POLICY

As the semester draws to a close, you may realize that you will need some extra time to complete your work in one of your courses. What follows is a review of the extension policy at Lancaster. Please review this policy on pages 15-16 of the MDiv Handbook and on pages 10-11 of the MAR Handbook.

- \* You may take only ONE extension during a semester. This means that you need to plan your coursework so that it is all completed by the deadline set in the course syllabi, except for the ONE course in which you take an extension.

- \* Extensions are not automatic. You may request an extension by filling out a "Request for Extension of Class Work" form (available in Shirley Laukhuff's Office). The decision is then made in consultation with others: the form must be signed by the professor teaching the course and by your advisor.

- \* Extension forms must be turned in to Anne Mavrides in the Dean's Office PRIOR TO the end of the academic term. (Note well: If the Dean's Office does not have a signed extension form filed when grades are turned in, and a professor has not turned in a grade for you, we enter an "F" on your transcript for that course.)

- \* All work from a Fall term extension must be completed by February 1.

- \* Under extenuating circumstances, you may request more than one extension. If you think you will need to do this, you must make an appointment with the Associate Dean to discuss it before you file the additional extension. NO additional extensions will be accepted without the signature of the Associate Dean.

Hopefully you won't need to make use of the extension policy, but, if you do, it will be to your benefit to follow the procedures outlined in the handbook (we don't like entering "F's"! ). Thanks for your cooperation.

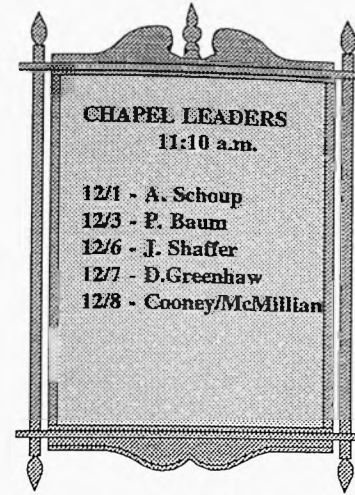
## HYMNALS FOR THE CHAPEL

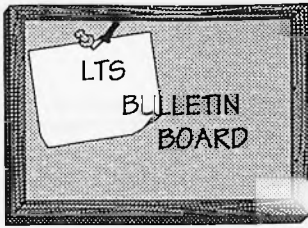
P.S. Please be sure to save lids from 12 ounce frozen fruit juices for the "tin" punch ornament. Place them in the box by the mailboxes.
