What in the world did the pastor mean by that statement??

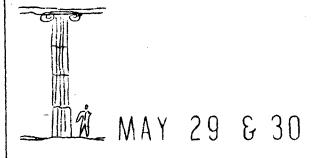

Hell really is a condition, a state of experience, even a place, or a disrelationship with God or fellowmen. One can even see it in the church!

But by taking all this Hell upon his shoulders, by bearing the load of the guilt and condemnation which all men deserve, the Son of God released us from the grip of the Devil, from slavery to him, from incorporating sin, from captivity to devilish powers. In other words, God had begun to rescue us from Hell through the death and joyful resurrection of His Son. And we need that rescue every day. We must have faith in Him to believe in his victory (for us) over the Hell of the grave. When Christ offers Himself to us

for incorporating the penefits of his life, we must take advantage of his offering. Better yet, we must forever be humble and thankful to Him. And we must be interested and spirited in serving his offerings (indeed in making Him known) in all the hellish situations round about us: the disobedient church (and individuals), the Appalachian Trail of poverty, the city slum and ghetto, etc.

When we look around us, or inside us, we still see the powers of Hell rampant on the earth - it's like a snake; though its head is cut off, it squirms and coils as if a deadly danger yet. Though Christ has laid the ax at the head, evil and sin and death pose as a threat to us all. Consequently, it's not hard at all to see the threat of Hell in slums and racial war, in the fear of atomic annihiliation, in sickness, in earthquake, in narcotics, in alcohol and cancer-sticks, in American hypocrisy, in exclusiveness or even segregation or schism in any church. To be human is to be Hell. People express that in their slang: "You're a Helluva person"; "The Devil's just stickin' out of his eyes"; "She looks like Hell"!

Now by the power of God in Christ, the Christian finds himself, or more humbly is found, midway between Heaven and Hell - i.e., divine and human, saint and sinner.

The church, because it is made up of individuals who bear original sin (a little bit of Hell), can go to Hell because it is already there. Hence the church is aware of personal salvation in the context of its community. On the one hand, it can go to Hell that way. On the other hand, responsible Christians, in answer to Christ's command to "go" into all the world, must be willing to go to Hell outside themselves and to proclaim that in Christ there is forgiveness of sins, the triumph of good, victory over death and inheritance of eternal life - or release from Hell.

And so, Christians do (and can) get themselves in devilish situations wherever they are. Hell does take its multifarious forms and it has its many advocates. We need to ask ourselves: "When did I endure or overcome a 'helluva time' by the grace of God working in me?" Note how confident are the Christians, black and white, who face-to-face racial discrimination sing, "We shall overcome. . "!

Wherever, whenever, however Christians encounter Hell (even in themselves), they must recall and witness to Christ's promise that "even the gates of Hell shall not prevail against it (my Church)" -- Matt. 16:18.

Yes, the Church of Jesus Christ can go to Hell and must; but by the power of God in Jesus Christ and His Holy Spirit, she shall ultimately escape all Hell, be saved, and save others from it and themselves. To His honor and glory.

and tinder hearts

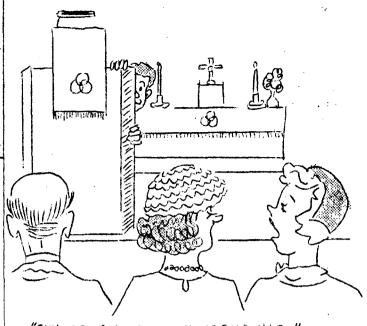
clog the cogs

IMBALANCES

There seems to be an over-emphasis in the Seminary Community on certain views which causes an imbalance to exist. For instance, there was during the week preceding the 28th of April, a strong emphasis to journey to Washington and witness for passage of the Civil Rights Bill while at the same time there was absolutely no emphasis upon casting one's ballot in the primaries. Of 22 Seniors polled, 13 went to Washington, and of those who went, only five voted or planned to vote absentee. On a percentage basis, 36.4 per cent of the Senior Class (assuming negligible few are registered "Independent") voted or planned to vote absentee. and this fact bears out an imbalance of emphasis.

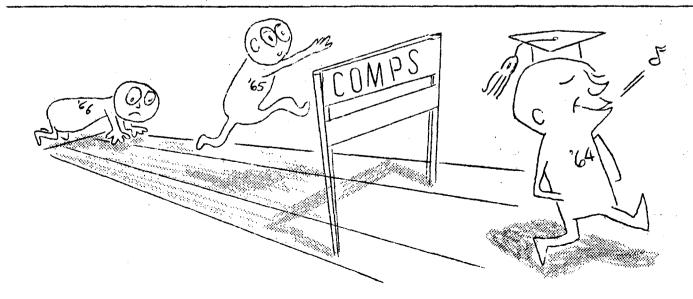
Another imbalance may be implied in the exalting (excessively it seems) of the values of being a Democrat. The impression one receives is almost that there should be only one party in the United States. No one on the Faculty nor in the Seminary Community would want such an unfortunate circumstance to occur. It should also be noted that one strong party opposed by one weak party is the same as a democratic dictatorship. Granted, one is to cast his ballot according to the qualifications of the man, and according to the ability of the man to carry through the program he is championing, but this does not apply to a party, for both Republican and Democrat parties have some good points, but they both also have a certain stench about them which often makes one thoroughly sick in his stomach.

Another imbalance exists in the emphasis regarding the settlement of Negro families outside the slum areas of the City. The emphasis seems only in aiding the families to move out, for there is no emphasis upon getting non-Negro families to move into the Ward. Only the more financially established Negroes can move out of the Ward, thus creating a vacuum, keeping the average earning capacity of those in the Ward at a low figure, and therefore aiding the slum to continue to exist as a slum. One of many answers to the problems in the Ward is for several financially sound 'White' families to move into the Ward. But this is viously not enough. The Ward also needs families who have good Christian ethics. It would be well for the Faculty to consider challenging several of its families to move into the Ward - into the heart of the Ward - to live and witness among the people there, emptying themselves in so many ways among so many who are looking for exemplary lives which are "lights set upon a lamp stand". This would also mean changing one's membership to Faith U.C.C., and giving that church the same unselfish dedicated service which is now given in other churches where membership is held. This would not be easy on anyone, but it is felt Dr. Schwalm's example will be lost if not followed soon by that of other laity and clergy. Unfortunately, this too is not the complete answer, but it would be a step in the right direction.

NOTES FROM THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL MEETING

OF THE SOCIETY OF INQUIRY April 2, 1964

At the regular meeting of the Executive Council, the Co-Editor of The Seminarian, Don Quayle, requested permission to "build" a staff of interested students to work on the publication. The staff would be open to students of all classes which may help in greater continuity in the future. The suggestion was warmly received and the request granted, along with \$20.00 for publication of a summer copy of The Seminarian which will go out to all Middlers, Juniors, and incoming students.

President Weller emphasized that anyone wishing to schedule an event in the Seminary community should see Genevieve Piercy for placement of the event on the Seminary calendar.

A discussion followed on the designation of Lenten offerings. Earlier in the school year, the Executive Committee had decided that all monies collected from benevolent giving would go to the Committee for Racial Justice Now. Recently the Executive Committee decided to avoid benevolence projects on campus which duplicate projects in local parishes. Thus, the Committee voted to send the Lenten offerings to the Frank Landis Memorial Fund. Since commitments had been made to both Benevolent projects, the Executive Committee voted to send the sum of \$108.34, the amount of Lenten offerings, to both the Frank Landis Memorial Fund and to the Committee for Racial Justice Now, the additional money to be taken from the General Fund of the Society. Also, if any monies are received for benevolences during the remainder of the school year, for any other benevolent purpose, then, a like amount will be sent to the Committee for Racial Justice Now.

The Executive Committee accepted the provisions of the former Constitution as a basis for the coming elections of officers of the Society. The election is scheduled for Tuesday, May 5th.
