REMINDER TO THE SEMINARY COMMUNITY

It will not be long until the seminary community will be involved in voting for new officers for next year's Seminary Community Council. The SCC is our seminarian working body, or student government. By the preamble of its constitution, the SCC is defined as follows: "The Seminary Community Council, representing the members of the seminary community, will seek to deepen and enrich the lives of the entire seminary community in social, mental, and spiritual growth, with an immediate concern for the future calling of the community members to the work of the Christian Church."

Although to some the SCC may seem to be an ethereal organization, it has been meeting regularly in the HUB, and has handled such projects as the Bach Mai Hospital Fund drive, cleaning up the storage rooms for apartment dwellers, studying the Faculty-Seminarian committees, working for quiet hours in the dorms, sponsoring programs such as the Winter Festival and the up-coming Arts Festival.

The SCC is an organization working for the community and by the community. All SCC meetings are open to the seminarian community, and the minutes of the meetings are posted publicly in the HUB for all to read. The SCC is, at present, the only student power base.

With the election of the SCC officers (president, vice-president, secretary-tresurer), and two representatives from the student body at large, coming up in the second week of April, we would urge all seminarians to practice their privilege of voting for the candidates of their choice.

A LETTER OF CONCERN

This past Sunday we celebrated One Great Hour of Sharing. At the church at which I serve as Youth Director, the minister preached a sermon which stung me very deeply. Late last year, Grace Church was involved in raising money for food for the hungry. Three Methodist conferences under Bishop Ault participated in raising \$106,631 which bought 12,049,303 pounds of food valued on the open market at \$1,066,310. The United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) saw to it that the money got food to starving people.

The sermon on Sunday was about Jesus' miracle of feeding the 5000 and how he could still perform the miracle of feeding the hungry today if only we, who have the resources, would stop being greedy and share with others because of our faith in Christ. It seems almost incredible that giving not very much money can get so very much food (\$100,000=12,000,000 poinds of food). How much more could giving alot result in more people not starving to death?

I felt very guilty during the sermon because I could give so little. Our budget is so close to breaking even that I can scarcely respond to more than my budgetted giving to the church. Any extra money I have I must earmark 'tuition' or 'tripabroad' because these are items I cannot squeeze into our budget; but they need to be paid. I feel like a hypocrite. People are starving in this world but I am trying to hoard a good deal more than \$1200 for myself and my wife to go to Germany and have a good time. I wonder if it would be better to just read a book about the church ind Germany and go to the Ocktoberfest in Barnesville to get the flair of German cook-, ing and culture?

The problem of starving people, the cry for real sharing will grow considerably in the future. Does it seem fair for us, on the one hand, to ask our church, including ourselves, to respond to the hungry (and respond poorly in view of what God gives us), and, then, on the other hand, plan extravagant educational opportunities for such a limited few: 40 people going overseas @ well over \$500 or \$600 per person base price, plus the additional money for presents, trips, and souvenirs, plus the money the Seminary contributes to keep the costs down? Is it fair? I am really struggling with this question.

I really want to go to Germany and look forward to it. But I want to practive what



CELEBRATION ROAD SHOW

When my son was little, and the neighborhood kids who were bigger than he was bullied him, or treated him badly in games, I forbid him to play with them. Or, I tried to. But the boy was wiser than I, and kept going back until he had won his place in their society. In my anguish over his unfair treatment, since I couldn't have any direct influence over those who were being mean to him, I protested by taking him out of the game. His instincts led him to go back again and solve the problem by being involved.

I sympathize with Fred Barker's anguish over the issue of the immorality of war, and particularly Viet Nam. But isn't pulling the chaplains out of the military involvement the same kind of cop-out I tried with my son? We can't solve the problem of our country's involvement in wars that have no moral justice to back them up (what war has any moral justice behind it?) by refusing to allow those men trapped into it by the laws of their country the comfort of pastoral care that has authority behind it. That's a cop-out.

The real issue underneath this debate seems not to be the military chaplaincy, but the fact that it represents a posture our government has that it is justified in waging war when and where it pleases. Viet Nam taught the American people the error behind this posture. But the responsibility for it, and for our involvement in the war, lies with all of us who allowed Congress to abdicate its responsibility to declare war.

In the panic over our ability to respond to jet or rocket propelled nuclear attack, we gave the President power to order troop involvement and moves for national defence without diredt advice from Congress. was plenty of time for debate in the legislature before troops were committed to Viet Nam. We were not threatened by imminent attack. Then why the insidious increase in our involvement? We can guess at the motives for it, some of which might be the great industrial-military complex that profits from War. But I think the main issue to be faced is that we allowed the decision to go to war to be made by one man in the executive branch, instead of by the representatives of the people in the legislative branch. If America goes to war, we'll have to fight it, and we ought to decide for ourselves whether the issue is worth the horror. But to protest a situation from a religious point of view by not allowing 'Henry" to play is a cop-out that is so ineffectual that it is reliculous.

HAPPINESS CAKE RECIPE


First, the ingredients:

Tennis: Interest has been expressed in setting up some kind of tournament (strictly non-pro!). If this is your thing, let Rob know, so we can get going!


