An alumnus writes:

"It is my sincere hope that Lancaster Seminary continues to provide preparation for the parish ministry. While it is true that there is an over-abundance of ministers. there is a shortage of parish ministers. Look at the vacancies, they are there. However, they are there only for those individuals who are willing to serve normal everyday. people. People that cannot pay \$10,000 base salary, but people none-the-less that need the guidance provided by a pastor. The small community is made up of Christians also, the city and budget don't have a monopoly on Christ. Keep up the parish training, LTS, because each year you graduate a few ministers that take these small communities as their first choice rather than as their last, waiting for the 'right' job. It is for this reason and because of the purpose of LTS that she remains a valuable experience in the Church."

#### Collegium Development

Information Reported: The Collegium Development Committee has reviewed and analyzed this year's collegium program and has concluded that collegium is a viable and positive educational process and worthy of inclusion in a seminarian's education for the ministry. This decision was based on joint faculty and student opinion. Student opinion was collected throughout the year and specifically at the committee's meeting on February 25, 1974 in which each collegium sent a representative to give an indication of their feelings toward the collegium process.

Therefore, the committee is in the process of planning for next year's collegia formation. Basically, there are two alternatives for the formation arising from the fact of next year's incoming Juniors. It is anticipated that the 1974 Junior Class will approximate the size of this year's class.

The first alternative is to have segregated collegium groups per each class. One advantage of this approach is to prevent reviewing of the same basic data that this year's participants have gone over. Secondly, it allows communication channels which have been built in the collegia (sometimes through a long and arduous process) to be broadened because of the fact of familiarity among the members of a collegia group.

The second alternative is to integrate the classes in the formation of the collegia. Obvious advantages of this method are also twofold. First, people who have experienced seminary life have valuable insights and contributions to share with next year's Juniors. Some collegia this year have regarded very highly the opinions of their Senior members.

Before I state the second advantage it is necessary to realize the following facts. It is assumed the collegia will consist of 7 to 10 members (students and preceptors); above 10 members in a group inhibits group communications and accomplishments. Therefore, sheer numbers of approximately doubled student participation would dictate subdividing of existing collegia groups. As a result next year's groups would consist of subgroups of this year's collegia plus next fall's Juniors.

The second advantage is, therefore, that the changing of collegia groups would portray a dynamic parish environment more realistically. A limited change of this nature would not inject chaos into the program, and would permit collegia retaining a sense of continuity.

The present model the Collegium Development Committee is considering consists of the following:

- 1) Juniors and Middlers integrated within collegia groups.
  - a) A three to five week classroom and group experience meeting once a week starting in October (or late September). The time would be divided to include both examing the theory of group interaction (Middlers could reflect on their past year's experience) and actual practice of group interaction.
  - b) This composite group would then determine the specific procedures for implementing group formation (combining collegia subgroups and Juniors).
- 2) Seniors would have their collegia groups which would focus on the following:
  - a) Discussion and implementation of plans for placement in the parish ministry.
  - b) Determination of objectives and goals for continuing education.

In this approach it is hoped to draw on the insights of upperclassmen. It will portray the changing parish environment in a mere realistic manner. It will not force Seniors to review repetitious material and will facilitate them in their placement, in a very busy time of their seminary education.

Please keep in mind this is only a proposed model. The committee invites your comments and constructive criticism from clergy, students, faculty, and administrators. The collegia process can be an important part of one's seminary education. It deserves each individual's concern and consideration. Please feel free to contact me or any member of the Collegium Development Committee before April 18, 1974.
