It's surprisn' how much you can learn about people from a good bird I remember Joe Warren's dog, He was a big, rangy, liver colored pointer, with a hard, stubborn head, a loud bark, and a belligerent manner. We used him with my dogs (which Joe had given me) when we hunted quail together. Everytime we let Spec out of the truck he'd take off for the nearest woods, and if we were lucky enough to find a covey next to it, he'd point. Otherwise, Spec was off huntin' for himself. If he jumped a deer, it was goodbye Spec for half an hour until the deer had run out of the county. He always came back and he always got a wippin' when he got back, but we didn't shoot many birds over Spec's points for the first couple times out.

By contrast, my dog, Lady, wasn't as big as Spec, and she was lemon colored, friendly, didn't bark too much, and affectionate. Lady was so affectionate I had to boot her in the rear to make her work at all. But, when there were birds around Lady found 'em. Sometimes the birds were pretty far out in front when she pointed and I had to walk up behind her and we'd inch up on the covey together, but we could be pretty sure that when Lady pointed there were birds. She never got a wippin': rather she usually got a pat on the head and a hug from me when the day's work was finished. I liked Lady a lot, even though she thought she was supposed to eat the quail instead of fetch 'em to me. I put up with Lady's faults because she was so friendly. It's mighty hard to be mad at a dog who wags her tail and smiles at you, dog fashion, every time you come into the yard. On the other hand, I hated to have to feed Joe's Spec because I was never sure he wouldn't bite me when I stepped into his pen.

As it happened durin! the time we lived in Georgia, I had a boss who made life pretty miserable. I no sooner moved down there than he demoted me for somethin! I couldn't help because I was followin! instructions; it made me kinda sore. So I growled at him a lot, never gave him a kind word, and talked nasty to him

when things weren't right. It's a wonder I didn't get fired. Joe was a good friend. One day, when ol' Ben, my boss, had been particularly hard to live with, I was sittin' in Joe's kitchen over bourbon an' Sprite cussin about Ben. This was several years before the Lord told me to go to seminary, and I did that sort of thing then. Joe listened for awhile and then said, "Phil, you look out there at Spec. Now that dog's you."

Now if you approach Ben the way Lady approaches you, you'll get along a lot better."

Since he was boss it sort of worked out in a 30 to 70 ratio.

THE WORK CASE STUDY

On a fine Wednesday afternoon, Sunday sermon, I received a phone DW call from Mr. U. He seemed very upset wrong. I agreed to come over and see ... him immediately.

When I arrived, Mr. U, red-eyed and visibly upset, let me in. He showed me to the living room. Immediately, he sighed deeply and tears welled up in his eyes.

"I just don't know what to do", he began. "The steel plant just laid me off. How can I support my kids? Who will employ a forty-six year old man who's only poured steel all his life?"

Mr. U laid out the whole story. It seems his steel plant supplies Detroit carmakers directly. When car sales dropped in the recession, steel production dropped. When steel production dropped, the plant began laying off workers. Mr. U. had seniority, but the company was so hard hit that 75% of its employees were released from their jobs. Mr. U was the last man in the 75% to be axed. He needed food immediately. The unemployment

In Bishops Austin Pardue's book <u>Prayer Vorks</u>, he recommends an exercise to believers before they attempt to pray. He instructs them to sit alone in a room, relaxing as they breath deeply. Then quietly repeat, "In the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Ghost" over and over--about five or six times slowly. Then one stops and just allows themselves to feel the presence of God around and through them.

At times when I have found prayer difficult, this method has always proved to be rewarding--and although prayer may still have been somewhat difficult, one real and powerful result has always been produced. The presence of God has always been known. No matter how "down in the dumps", or frustrated I have felt, that presence is always a buoying force. The presence of God is always positive, when I feel negitive. One does not feel forgotten or alone-one loses any sense of "fear" or "dismay". Upon the completion of the period of meditation and "prayer", it is possible to once again affirm the words of the prophet, as one sets about their tasks knowing that God has "strengthened" them and will "help" and "uphold" them through their difficulties. Whether with words or in silent meditation, prayer always should assure us that the Lord is "with thee".
