

Professor Niebuhr takes his place worthily among this large group of distinguished men. The faculty, symbon to, and alternal of the Seminary extend to him a hearty welcome, both as a member of our our household of faith and as a worthy successor of those who have gone before him on the Stander Toundations Our visitor, is the author of many books, which have firmly established his international reputation. His ragrum opus, so far, is "The Nature and Destiny of Man," in two volumes, Only five Americonstituting the Gifford Lectures delivered in Glasgov in 1939. can scholars have been honored by invitations to speak to the entire world of scholarship from this famous platform. Moreover, the four American scholars who preceded Reinhold Miebuhr (Jones, Royce, Mocking, and Dowey) were philosophers. Reinhold Niebuhr, the fifth in that notable galaxy, is the first american theologian chosen to lecture on the Gifford Foundation, Readers of his profound treatise require no proof that the Nature and Destiny of Man speaks with the authority of sound learning, and deep insight into the structure of reality. These two books rank near the top of required reading for thoughtful near both lay and clericals Unless the weather plays us false. Santee Chapel will be crowded with alumni and friends onger to hear the course on "The Agoless Gospel in our Ago."

The McCouley lecturer this year is President-elect Allan So Meck. The fact that he has been chosen to the presidency of the Sommary adds now lustre to his name and fame as one of our leading proachers, and it also adds now interest to his appearance among us as one of the Convocation lecturers. The McGauley Lecture this year is being given by Dr. Allan S. Mock, introduced in the above article.

This Loctureship on Pastoral and Practical Theology was originated by the will of Mrs. Harriet O. McCauley Schrebberg, Rate of Mercersburg, Pas (1911) The bequest is to be "used in giving one or mire "ectures every year to the students on some practical subject relating to the simistry". Those lectures have been given annually since 1914.

### John I. Swander and the Swander Lectures . . . Fred P. Knierien

It is perhaps an occasion for blushing that the name of John I. Swander today stands mostly for someone connected with an annual becture series delivered here. Never having given more thought than this to the matter. I was forced to pere through some of the less frequented corners of the Library in order to glean a few facts about the man behind the lectureship. Within a limited time, then, the name took on new significance as his books yielded light on an interesting man, who was no mean figure in the history of the Theological Seminary.

Dr. Swender was born in 1833, and died some twenty-five years ago. During his long life, which he describes interestingly in The Remance of Religion. The Ivolustion of a Fami Boy, and his Autobiography, he found time to be graineded from (continued on page 3)

Reinhold Niebuhr, the Swander lecturer for 1947, was born in Wright City, Moo, of German parentage, His father Gustine Niebuhr, an ordained minister in the Twangelical Synod of North America, died when he was very young. Niebuhr studied at Elmhurst College, but he left in 1910 before he received his degree or had completed his undergraduate works. He acquired a EcDo degree from Yale Divinity School in 1914 and an A.Mo in 1915 after he had condicted at Edon Theological Seminary.

He was ordained a minister in his denomination in 1915 and accepted a call to Bethel Evengelical Church in Debroit, Michigen. While he remained in Detroit, he was profoundly affected by the rest of the automotive industry and its concenitant social and political problems. It make him a "chastoned liberal" in his outlook involving an turning to the left politically, and in turning to the right in theology.

He left Detroit in 1928 and in the same year Dr. Niebuhr accepted the rank of Associate Professor of Philosophy of Roligion at Union Theological Sminery. This chair he surrendered in 1930 for that of Applied Christianity at the same institutions

In 1940 he renounced his membership in the Fellowship of Reconciliation because he lent his active support to the ware. He greatly encouraged American intervention through speeches and magazine articles, the latter appearing particularly in "Christianity and Crisis, a bi-weekly of which he is a member of the editorial board. He has maintained his active social interests and at present is chairman of the Union for Denocratic Action, a group of intellectuals and labor leaders who maintain a lobby in Washington and issue a bi-weekly paper, Congressional Newsletter, vice chairman of the Liberal Party and a member of the recently organized Americans for Democratic Action. He has recently returned from an educational mission in Germany.

Among his more famous books are Moral Man and Immoral Society. Reflections on the End of an Era, An Interpretation of Christian Ethics, and The Nature and Destiny of Man. Because of his right-wing thoology and his left-wing social philosophy he has become one of America's most provocative thinkers.

Having been elected Associate Professor of Systematic Theology, he endowed with twenty thousand dollars the memorial lectureship which bears the name of his children, Sarah Ellen and Nevin Ambrose,

Properly enough, Dr. Swinder Collivered the initial lecture and almost all the others until his death in 1925. Gines are foundation provided for the publishment of the lectures, one can find twenty values, some of which were not delivered, beginning with those of the first flave yours (1901-05) Old Truths in New Forms and ending with the timely one entitled after Doubh — White, Where, Try? Since Dr. Swander's death, nineteen distinguished leaders in academic circles have continued the series annually with the exception of a wortame interruption. In recent years, Dr. Herman contributed his Sacramental Universe; and Edwin Aubrey, the lectures of last February. To this list of notables, we now prepare to add Reinhold Niebuhre
