Too long have we Christians worshipped a qauntitative God. A Diety adored because he is mighty and powerful, with his goodness and love an adjunct to his awesome cosmic energy, holds little claim over the hearts of a generation weened on atomic power and space flight. God must be worshipped because he is good, if he is to be worshipped at all by modern man, for we possess the destructive power attributed to the old gods (such as nuclear energy) and some of the healing powers assigned to the Divine as well (such as sustaining life artificially).

A quantitative God does not impress us; we hunger for Another. In the words of William Ellery Channing, "It is not because he is our Creator merely, but because he created us for good and holy purposes; it is not because his will is irresistible, but because his will is the perfection of virtue, that we pay him allegiance. We cannot bow before a being, however great and powerful, who governs tyranically. We respect nothing but excellence, whether on earth or in heaven. We venerate not the loftiness of God's throne, but the equity and goodness in which it is established."

Channing delivered that passage as part of his sermon in Baltimore entitled "Unitarian Christianity." The year was 1819. Only today are we beginning to understand how prophetic his words were. Dr. Channing called for the death of the quantitative God, and the resurrection of the qualitative God--the God of heavenly goodness, not devilish power.

A qualitative God need not be quantitatively powerful. Power is a value-neutral force: we can heat our homes with atomic energy, or we can scorch the earth free of all life with that same power. Indeed, the crux of the God is dead argument centers in the lack of power manifested by the so-called omnipotent God. If God is allpowerful, Unitarian-Universalist author Jack Mendelson says, he must not be the loving 'Abba' Father of Jesus, for he chose not to exercise his sovereign might when Hitler put his millions into the gas.

A quantative God--a God of power who can and does intervene in the natural order-cannot be a qualitative God who loves his children. But a strictly qualitative God-powerless to act in the physical world, showering us constantly with inspiration and loving support (which we can accept or utterly for he/she/it sounds a lot like the 'Abba' reject), calling us forth from nonliving to living to spiritual life, alternatively crying and rejoicing with us-- this God truly
