MONDAY, NOVEMBER 1-A Day in the Class of Paul Achtemeier

Today was beautiful! The one-hour session of NT 113 zipped by far too quickly. It seemed a real shame that the discussion of Paul's ideas of Righteousness and its implications for personal ethics should come to an end. But the hour did end, with one impression staying behind, giving a mandate for our lives: Christians, out of love, do what is best for their brothers. As was pointed out, this is a kind of "structured situation ethics" because what we do at a given time is determined, not by our needs, but by the needs of someone else.

This was the point in the class discussion, because it lifted Christian life and practice out of the realm of legalistic and pre-determined, static standards. Somehow, by seeing the Christian way of life in this way, too. On this basis, I must now feel the sharp dichotomy between thought and practice in an institution such as this.

Also dated November 1, was Dr. Glasse's announcement that "house and apartment rents are affected (by the <u>freeze</u>). . But it is our intention to secure approval for a ruling allowing us to collect rents at the rates announced for this year. This means that students renting apartments and houses from the seminary should plan on paying the rents announced in the catalog last spring . . . "

So why gripe? Where's the dichotomy? We were given fair warning, as Dr. Glasse reminded us at the close of his announcement. Why should we not pay the rents that have been announced?

There is one point this legalistic, pre-set, unchallengeable (e.g. the tone of "we intend to secure . . . ") position fails to take into account. That is the fact that although the rents may go up, for most of us who have to pay those rents income has not increased. Our wives who work and who have wage increases pending are not bringing home any more simply because our cost of living has increased here at the seminary. There will be no accompanying ruling that our wives' employers must pay them more so that we can afford to pay the increased rent. The seminary (i.e.—the "powers to be", the faculty and staff whose salaries are unaffected as Dr. Glasse noted) has apparently not given the immediate problems and needs of the students any consideration as it has gone on continuing

PARISH TRAINING PROGRAM

Five students are now engaged in an experimental program designed to prepare them for "professional leader-ship for parish churches." The objectives of PTP have been stated as follows:

- 1. To introduce the seminary student to professional life as a minister.
- 2. To relate theological education data to people and situations as found in parishes.
- 3. To enable students to learn how to learn from their own experience.

4. To return participating students to the campus-based program with professional focus for their further theological education.

That program is now going on in Harrisburg, Pa. Students are working in a variety of ways along side of ministers and the churches in which they Besides the day to serve. day contact with a variety of expressions of church life, the students meet weekly with themselves in a professional development or growth seminar. And finally, the "collegium" is to meet monthly, here on campus for an afternoon seminar which is to involve faculty and students alike. The weekly seminars so far worked through have been concorned with such matters as: Holy Communion, Baptism, Confirmation, Church Membership, The Minister's understanding of his Calling, and finally, Stewardship. Out of these weekly seminars, the subject matter for the first monthly seminar has been developed by the students themselves. It is in the form of a question; addressed to faculty members, who will make brief responses, following which, all present will be invited to participate. That first monthly seminar is to be held in the Hafer Center, on Wednesday, November 10, at 3:00 P.M., and YOU ARE ALL IN-

VITED. Indeed, it is to be hoped that as many members of our community will come as is possible.

It is reading week; there are no scheduled classes; many of us will be on campus. The three faculty members to speak are: Mrs. Achtemeier, Mr. Irion, and Mr. Vassady. The question addressed to them is:

The roots of Christianity are deep in a world view which is quite different from that which many people hold today. The secular trend away from supernaturalism, a manifestation of the modern world view, presents a conflict which must be dealt with by the Christian minister. Taking into account individual differences in theology (liberal and conservative), what guidelines are available from the Bible, current or traditional theology, and the history of the church, which would enable the minister to not only handle the conflict encountered with the people he talks to, but also in deciding his own stance on matters of: religionless Christianity (as understood by Bonhoeffer), praying, secular understanding of the Sacraments and those people who hold more religious understandings of these matters, especially those who would be termed 'fundamentalists?

Clearly the general nature of the question enables speakers and respondents to delve into critical areas concerning ministry today, on a cross field basis in the setting of the entire community.

The five students, Steve Gifford, Bob Stoudt, Dick Peebles, Jim Roth, and Randy Leisey, and myself, urge all of you to attend this campusbased seminar on November 10. Come and participate. You are all welcome.
