#### FACKRE NAMED PROFESSOR

Gabriel Fackre was recently named Assistant Professor-elect of Historical Theology and Christian Ethics. Mr. Fackre, prominent minister of the Evangelical and Reformed Church, has held several positions within the denomination in addition to full-time pastorates.

Mr. Fackre is a graduate of Bucknell University and the Divinity School of the University of Chicago. At the present time, he is completing requirements for his doctorate from the University of Chicago in order to better prepare himself for his teaching position here.

Mr. Fackre is the former head of the Radio-TV Committee and the Social Action Committee of the Evangelical Church. He has also served as a delegate to the General Synod of the denomination.

He was married to the former Dorothy Ashman, September 22, 1945. The couple have four children; Bonnie, 11; Gabrielle, 8; Judith, 7; and Skye, 2.

He is the author of "The Purpose and Work of the Ministry" and the co-author of "Under the Steeple". He has also done a great deal of mission work in Chicago, Pittsburgh, and West Mifflin.

The Fackre family will make their home in Lancaster beginning January 1, 1961. Mr. Fackre will take uphis duties at the seminary beginning Sept. 1, 1961.

Seminarians will remember the challenging talk given by Mr. Fackre on the subject of the work of the church in the industrial area during the 1959 Convocation.

# IRION ELECTED DEAN

Prof.Paul E. Irion, Associate Professor of Pastoral Theology, was named Dean of Students by the faculty here last week. Prof. Irion, who came to the seminary last year, was a natural choice for the position in the opinion of many members of the faculty and student body.

Prof. Irion's duties will include counseling, representing student interests to the faculty, and serving as advisor on admissions and scholarships. He will relieve the Dean of the Seminary of his counseling duties.

Prof. Irion is the first to occupy this newly created position. Dr. Lee J. Gable, presently on sabbatical leave, will assume the duties of Dean of the Seminary upon the retirement of Dr. David Dunn at the end of the present academic year.

#### WHICH WAYWHREWIND THE STEED

"Which Way the Wind?", a play in a new theatrical form called DocuDrama, will be presented by the Conestoga Sertoma Club on November 15, 8:00 pm at Hensel Hall, Franklin and Marshall College campus.

Written by New York playwright Philip C. Lewis for the American Friends Service Committee, "Which Way the Wind" is a dramatization of the nature and effects of warfare down through history. The play is being presented here as part of a sevenweek cross country tour covering thirty cities and twenty states.

For his script, author Lewishas drawn upon the Quaker study "Speak Truth to Power", historical letters and writings, aswell as quotes fromwell known literary figures, military leaders and the "New York Times."

### STUDENTS LEAD WORSHIP AT LONG'S HOME

As a result of a condition in a will made many years ago, students of the seminary conduct mid-weekworship services at Long's Home. Long's Home is an institution for elderly women located at Marietta and West End Avenues here in Lancaster. A stipulation in the will of Mr. Long, founder and chief donor of the home, requested that students of the Theological Seminary be permitted to conduct these services as long as they desire to participate.

Long's Home is inter-denominational in nature. This is attested to by the fact that the guests there come out of chiefly the Methodist, Baptist, and Evangelical and Reformed background. Attendance at the worship service is purely voluntary an the part of the ladies there. However, the gatherings usually consist of all guests who are physically able to attend.

Services are held each Thursday evening from 7:00 to 7:30 pm. Charles Neiswender is in charge of the program and should any student desire to conduct a service, he may contact Charles for more information.

#### INTERNATIONAL STUDENT SKETCHS

(Due to the limited time which many of our foreign students have within our midst, members of the campus community are often unable to become better acquainted with these fellow students from other lands. THE SEMINARIAN will give a brief biographical sketch each issue of one of the international students.)

#### ASHLEY SMITH

Ashley Alexander Smith was born in the village of Flower Hill, Parish of Hanover, Jamaica, West Indies, on September 24, 1929. He was the eldest of four children and spent the earlier part of his life on a farm in the parish of Westmoreland in Jamaica.

At the age of sixteen, Ashely entered the Teacher's Training College in Jamaica and received his diploma from that institution three years later. He was then accepted as a degree condidate by the University of London.

Ashley's decision to enter the Christian ministry stemmed from a deep concern for the people of the island of Jamaica. At the time of his graduation from Teacher's College, he was already serving in the capacity of lay preacher in the Presbyterian Church.

In 1950, he was admitted to the United Theological Seminary (now Union Theological Seminary) of Jamaica. After passing the required examinations four years later, he graduated from that institution. He also was awarded the Diploma in Theology by the University of London that same year.

After serving a year as a Licentiate, he was ordained into the Presbyterian Church of Jamaica. Before his departure to the United States, he was serving as a minister of the Retirement charge in the parish of West Elizabeth.

Ashley became the recipiant of a Church World Service Scholarship and a Fulbright Travel Grant earlier this year. His particular interest is in rural church work and hopes that his studies here will better prepare him for service to the people of the island of Jamaica. He is a candidate for the BD degree here in June, 1961.

to us that the physical condition of our bodies does play a part in our total reaction to a particular environment; but I think that the direct connection drawn between a case of indigestion and the acceptance of Christ as Savior is a little naive to say the least.

The question which is really up for discussion is, "Are these terms Good Biblical Terms describing God's act in history?" Any half-decent scholarly examination of Scriptures will find unanimous support for these terms; and in the basis of this I feel that to drop them from our Christian vocabulary is todo an injustice to the Gospel of Christ. To see these. terms as emotion provokers among people with abdominal disturbances is to suggest that the Early Christian communities and the Apostle Paul would have been satisfied with a bicarbonate of soda just as well as with Jesus Christ.

It seems to me that the modern or ancient preacher using these terms has no control over the diet of his listeners and to accuse him of a premeditated assault on their digestive tracts is less than fair. I would much rather credit their conversion to the work of the Holy Spirit--which is, incidentally, mentioned in the New Testament.

If there is any approach to be called into question I would suggest we examine our fair and square "give the devil a chance" modern approach to Christian Education. Here we are to provide the proper colored room, certain pictures, music, songs, and proper experiences all integrated to produce the proper Christian.

This whole process seems to me to be infinitely more devious, subjective, and unrealistic than an evangelist pointing out people's situation as sinners and telling them how they have been "Bought with a price," the blood of Christ on the Cross at Calvary."

I am not altogether disparaging modern Christian Education, nor am I altogether supporting full-blown fire and brimstone preaching; but I am saying that there is a necessary combination of the two. If we are to adequately present the Gospel of Christ to this day and age, we must find and use this combination.
