GREGORY LECTURE

The LTS community is encouraged to attend the Gregory Lecture, the opening event of the spring semester, on Thursday, February 4 at 11:10 a.m. in

Santee Chapel.



Speaker is Dr. Anthony Ugolnik, a recently ordained orthodox priest, who is a professor of English at Franklin & Marshall College. An outstanding interpreter of the Orthodox religion, Professor

Ugolnik is a frequent visitor to Russia where he coordinates humanitarian assistance to the former Soviet Union. His address is entitled, "Ethnic Cleansing and Eastern Orthodox Thought."

FACULTY SEARCH

As you may be aware, this fall a faculty-studenttrustee committee has been working to enlist and screen candidates for a faculty position in theology to succeed Professor Vieth upon his retirement in fall, 1993.

The committee has gathered dossiers on a great number of persons and has interviewed over a dozen qualified candidates.

We are now able to report to the community that we are unanimous in our recommendation of a candidate of outstanding experience and qualifications, Dr. Lee C. Barrett III, who is professor of theology at Presbyterian School of Christian Education in Richmond. Dr Barrett will be on campus Saturday, February 6 through Monday, February 8, for interviews with faculty and students. He will make a presentation to the campus community at 9:30 a.m. on February 8 in Lark 206. Later, students are invited to meet him during Chapel service on Monday, followed by a special lunch in the Refectory at no charge to members of the community.

COME HEAR HAL HOPSON!

"How to Appreciate Church Music," a participatory workshop by the well-known hymn composer Hal Hopson, will be held at LTS on Friday, February 19, from 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. Students are encouraged to join the group at \$5 per person, including lunch. The workshop, which is targeted to clergypersons, will include a refresher course in hymnology; how to improve hymn singing; and using music creatively in planning worship.

EARNED INCOME CREDIT

The Earned Income Credit is a tax credit for working families that had income of less than \$22,370 in 1992 and at least one child living at home for more than half the year. It is available both to married and single parents. Even families that earn too little to owe federal income tax can be eligible for the EIC.

Chaplain Kroehler has received four pages of information for anyone interested in learning more about EIC, A FACT SHEET and a SAMPLE, FILLED OUT "SCHEDULE EIC." Please ask him for a duplicate copy of these pages. Or you can get answers to your questions about the EIC by calling 1-800-829-1040. You can also listen to a recorded message on the EIC by calling the IRS "teletax" service. The instructions are on the Fact Sheet.

The basic EIC for families with one child is worth a maximum of \$1,384 in 1992. it varies with your income. Most eligible families earning between \$6000 and \$14000 will qualify for at least \$1000.

The Earned Income Credit is a refundable credit, which you can get even if you owe no income tax. (You may even file for retroactive EIC payments from the last three years if you did not owe federal income taxes). Or it can be used to reduce the amount of tax you owe. If the family's credit is greater than the amount of taxes it owes, the family's tax bill will be reduced to zero, and the IRS will send the family a check for the remainder of its EIC. This is worth checking into.

MORAVIAN SEMINARY PRESENTS WRIGHT/LEBACQZ

The Rev. Jeremiah A. Wright, Jr., and Dr. Karen Lebacqz, will be part of the spring lecture series at Moravian Theological Seminary, Bethlehem, Pennsylvania. Wright, a distinguished author, preacher and pastor, has lectured extensively on the black church.

He will present two lectures, "Getting New Members for God," on Thursday, February 18, at 7:30 p.m., and "Making the Church a Church," 10:00 a.m. on Friday, February 19. Lebacqz, a professor of Christian Ethics at Pacific School of Religion, has published numerous essays and books on medical ethics, sexuality and justice.

Her lectures, on Thursday, April 1 at 10:00 a.m. and 2:30 p.m are titled, "Justice and the Human Genome" and "Women and Health Care: What Every Pastor Should Know." All lectures are free and open to the public.
