LOVE IS A VIOLENT FEELING

When the Town Meeting broke up, there were several statements from members of the gathering that seemed to be plaintively calling for an atmosphere of "love". In a seminary that seems to be a sacred word, evoked in the belief that it has magical powers to soothe over ruffled feathers. As Catfish says, "It ain't necessarily so.". I've been associated with another human being in the intimacy generally recognized as "love" for over twenty years, and cur relationship has endured some of the most violent fights in Christendom. We even fight for fun. To an outsidem, the combat is charged with emotional danger that threatens to break up the marriage. But to us, it's merely what the Irish call "blowin' the stink off." From this relationship, in the calmer moment of contemplation, I've learned that no relationship is worth a damn between two people or two hundred people if yourre not willing to fight over issues. What breaks up a marriage, and will destroy this community, is the refusal to bring the points of distress, With all the emotions, the anger involved, out into the open.

Since coming to seminary, I've also fought with fellow students and professors over issues I have cared about. We're still friends. In fact, we're closer friends because we cared, or didn't care, enough to get out in the open what had been bugging us.. To fight requires love. It required that each must love himself, first. When it's over, he finds out he loves the other guy, too, even if he thinks the guy is what Harry Truman called that critic. 'That name doesn't apply to anybody on campus except yours truly,

One of the things I like best about this seminary is the frequent sights of students wearing the clerical garb on campus. This was not the case at the school I attended last year. I don't know if the presence of clerics indicates a preference for such work clothes or a resignation that this is the Bible Belt of Pennsylvania and white-collar is what we are expected to wear, but I hope it's the former. I like clerics. There are many reasons why, but here occur a few more obvious ones to me:

- 1) Clerical garb signifies church. You walk into a store and people know you aren't a lawyer or a plumber. You pick up a hitch-hikker and he tells you his problems. You visit a person in the hospital and nobody asks, "What are you doing here?"
- 2) Clerics make me self-conscious, and I mean that in a positive sense. When one is aware that people know you are a minister (or aspiring minister), it has a good effect on one's own character. No, I don't mean a person in clerics is playacting or being a goody-goody. What I mean is when I wear the collar I know the standard of conduct that it represents, and feel both my inadequacy in reaching that standard and my determination to do In a very healthy sense, it becomes a judgement upon me, a reminder of the need for self-improvement, a silent witness to aspirations that are often forgotten in the hustle of everyday life.
- 3) The collar is a symbol of one's bondage to the Lord--whatever you conceive that to mean. For me it represents a solemn and happy covenant made between the Caller and the called, the Master and the servant, the Holy and the wholy inadequate. It is not a symbol of slavery, but of service rendered freely by a free being. It is not another-worldly tie between the Ground of our being and the fellow who sleeps in the parsonage; it is a sign that indicates a person grounded in service to his fellow man.

WOMEN AT LANCASTER SEMINARY

Here, as elsewhere, "the number of women seeking to minister as a life profession is growing by leaps and bounds." This is a phrase from an evocative editorial introduction to the Winter 1975 THEOLOGICAL EDUCATION, published by the Association of Theological Schools. It was written by the editor of this issue, Arabella Meadows-Rogers. She has put together a stimulating 63 pages about the impact women are having and will have upon theological education and upon ministry which I recommend to all Lancaster persons - male, female, students, faculty - for careful reading. Perhaps we should organize a town meeting or two on the subject as well.

Some articles describe approaches outside seminary walls, some within. The Seminary Quarter for Women at Grailville: Toward a Feminist Approach to Theologi, cal Education is the first. "A Modest Proposal" by Fay Hollingshead Ellison documents the exploitation of women by the church and suggest some supportive changes. Five women share a panel on Women Theologizing: Naming and Claiming Our Style. There are also a Survey of Interests and Agendas of Women in U.S. Church Denominations; Women in the Seminary: A Roman Catholic Perspective; Association of Theological Schools Affirmative Action Plan; and (most women may want to buy into this:) Doctoral Placement Service for Women in Religion. There is another (disturbing) panel of seminary men-faculty and students - about needed changes in our living of the patiarchal tradition and in men.

Try to borrow a copy from a member of the faculty (all male) or from the library.
