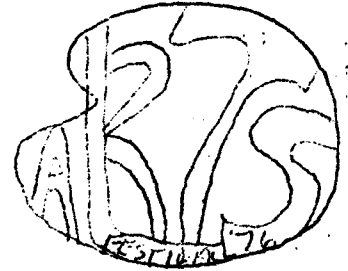
FOURTH ANNUAL ARTS FESTIVAL COMING TO LANCASTER SEMINARY

HERETIC IN THE HUB

Presidential hopeful Jimmy Carter says, simply, "Trust me." He is asking for a lot, considering this nation has sunk to its lowest level of cynical skepticism in the 20th century during the four years preceding this campaign. Yet, the hope lives on that there will be someone or something in which we as a people can trust. Our coins and currency proclaim it to be God, but our empty sunday schools and declining church rolls call such a graven declaration into question. At least, the God of mainline Christianity is not trustworthy, if we can infer from the declining rolls a declining trust.

Evangelical fundamentalism, on the other hand, is growing by leaps and bounds. And the followers of turn-or-burn theology are trusting souls to a man.

Yet, somewhere between the wet noodle of mainline Churchianity and the absolute certainty of fundamentalism, the great mass of our countrymen huddle in mistrust of nearly everything: the church, the schools (which bus the kids and produce highschool graduates who can't read), government (which promises the moon and delivers inflation), the courts (which free criminals and jail marijuana users), congress (which does nothing and makes it a law of the land), the President (who was appointed by a crook whom he then pardoned), the family (which divorces and regroups with impunity), the military (which couldn't win the Vietnam war but managed to lose 50,000 lives), the medical profession (\$\$\$\$ ad nauseum), political parties (you know), the press (which is about objective and impartial as Pravda, yet not nearly as accurate), higher education (which takes four years to produce a kindergarten teacher to teach kids to play in a sandbox, but she can't find a job anyway), and Mom's Apple Pie (nobody bakes anymore).

"Trust me," says Jimmy Carter. The remarkable thing is that many people, myself included, are willing to give him the benefit of the doubt. That we have been ripped off by our leaders time and again, and yet still yearn for honesty and integrity and will risk a costly investment of trust (for we know it could happen again), speaks of something indomitable in the human spirit. Perhaps it is the old Messianic Hope--and thus akin to the dangers of fanaticism and blind faith. Or perhaps it is the Diogenes in each of us, seeking with our lamps an honest man. My hope is that if we find such
