
## COOK LECTURE COMING UP

"A Sacred Trust: The Public Role of Religious Buildings" is the title of the 1994 Cook Lecture to be presented in Santee Chapel, Thursday, April 7, at 7:30 p.m. Robert Jaeger of Partners for Sacred Places in Philadelphia will discuss the historical and architectural roots of the Lark Building. Professor Rochelle Stackhouse, adjunct instructor in Worship and Preaching at Lancaster, will comment on the liturgical implications of the design of Santee Chapel, including its relation to Mercersburg liturgical theology. The two will offer responses to each other and to questions from those attending. The lecture is open to our community and the public without cost.
