One standout was Masters who played a fine defensive game on the Seminary forward wall.

The following week the squad took on the City six, hop-ing to even their season's record. But fate was not with them, for on several lucky breaks the opponents cashed in on scoring opportunities to crush the Crusaders to the tune of 18-0. Big John Winter struck fear in the enemy heart by his violent rushing and blocking. Finally the Seminary came to life, and passes from Glatfelter to Settlemyer carried the ball deep into the territory of the City team as the final gun went off. Last Thursday, a makeshift Seminary squad clashed with an untested Newman Club. From the outset the Crusaders were in Early in the this contest. first quarter the collegians scored by a pass to a receiver in the end zone. But this day our boys were not to be denied. In the next quarter, just before half-time, Abernethy passed to Lutz who raced the remaining 50 yards for the tally. The conversion failed on an incomplete pass from Abernethy to Masters. The score at the half-way mark was all tied up, 6-6. Air-tight defensive play featured the next two quarters of play with some terrific line bucking by Yoder. In the last minute of play, the Seminary, deep in its own territory, bobbled a punt which the F&M boys recovered. With twenty seconds remaining, a pass found a big hole in the Crusader secondary, and the recriver romped on to pay dirt

and a 12-6 victory for the Newman Club. That was a tough one to lose. Injuries continued to plague the Seminarians as Stan Dunn was lost to the team with

an injured rib.
