Study Committee Revisions Proposes

The work of the Society's special Study Committee on the present constitution and structure of our student organization, which began in late January, has resulted in a Lengthy report of proposed revi-

This committee report was read and discussed by members of the excutive council of the present Society of Inquiry, and was then revamped after a jointmeeting of the executive council and the study committee. Results of this session led to the creation of a new constitution for a "New Society" by Prof. Moss (advisor to the Society), Willard Wetzel (president of the Society), and Gerald Hinkle(chairman of the study committee).

The new and proposed constitu-tion, after these many weeks of work and deliberation, must be approved by the executive council and the faculty before it can be multigraphed and distributed among all seminarians for their approval and study.

At present, the scoond week in April seems the most likely time for the releasing of this new plan of organization. All seminarians are urged to avait this new plan with genuine interest; so that a later meeting of the student body may be called for a public discussion and possible ratification of this proposed organizational structure.

Veteran Speaks

The word of a veteran is often worth attention. I recently discovered a book not often called for in our Library, but of great interest, EARLY YEARS AND LATE REFLECTIONS, by Dr. Emil P. Herbruck, 1885-1940, who served for sixty-five years in our ministry, in two churches, Grace, Akron and Trinity, Cancon, Chio. He speaks of his boyhod in his father's parsonage, of his father's library, and his great love and jealous care of it. And he quotes his father concerning books: "I shall never forget his illuminating words to me on this subject while sitting alone with him in the library one summer afternoon. Pointing to his books, he said: 'What a privilege it would have been for you to meet the men represented here, St. Faul, St. Augustine, Luther, Wesley, Krummacher, Goethe, etc. I imagine what your regret would have been if you had been asked to meet any of them and had refused. You could never have forgiven yourself that mistake. Yet, if you had seen them face to face, in all likelihood, your brief conversation would have had little value. It would probably have been of the weather, the political situation, some trivial personality or other commonplace of the day. In their books, however, these men reveal to you their inmost thought and heart in such a way as was never granted any except a favored few. These books are cept a favored few. These books are a standing invitation to fellowship with these men, the rarest spirits of the last twenty-five centuries. That is why I regard this room as a sanctum and insist upon deferential treatment of these volumes.'"
