MIDDLER BANQUET A HUGE SUCCESS

The Seminary refectory was the scene of an excellent campaign in support of the Student Exchange program, as the total amount of money raised exceeded \$775, nearly doubling the goal of \$400. It was 6:35 p.m. on April 25, when Middler President Dave Koch opened the program with a Scripture reading followed by a prayer. After a fine dinner prepared by "Mon" and her staff, Deacon read a letter from Rudy, last year's exchange student, who expressed his regret that he was unable to attend the banquet.

The feature speaker of the evening was our own Roger, who confessed that he was a bit nervous. His address, however, did not reveal this condition, as he skillfully mingled humor with a warm message. He related the fact that when he first knew that he was coming to America, he had four seminaries in mind, none of which was Lancaster. When he found out where he was assigned, he consulted his map, but was dismayed not to find Lancaster. Furthermore, he added, "It wasn't in my dictionary." He expressed the conviction that life in our Seminary family more than made up for the geographical obscurity of this city. Roger extended the invitation to all to visit him in his parish in France; he promised to serve plenty of wine or water, as his visitors desired.

The next item on the program was a series of pantomines by Charles Hull, a clever 15-year-old lad. His most popular effort was the portrayal of a wistful youngster attempting to give away an ever increasing surplus of bunnies.

The auction, of course, was the highlight of the evening. J.G.'s polished spiel added to the enjoyment of the proceedings. Larry Fisher and Dr. Gable assisted J.G. for a while; though lacking some of J.G.'s finesse. They were equally successful in distributing various items at generous prices. The most spirited bidding was, rightly, between the President and Dean of our Seminary, as Dr. Dunn doled out \$18.00 for a car wash and wax job. A box of diapers brought a surprising \$6.50 from John Stoudt for, of all people, Frank McConnell.

During a break in the program the faculty quartet rendered (:) appropriately, "When You and I Were Young, Maggie." Then the faculty quartet (plus one) struggled through "The Happy Wanderer," which was surprisingly good, despite the comment that the most musical part about the number was during a passage when someone dropped a quarter.

One of the most interesting services was offered by Jim Bright, who offered to drive anyone anywhere, so long as the round trip took no more than 14 hours (6 p.m. - 8 a.m.). Someone bid \$3.50 for Nancy Wright; Bruce Wickkiser raised that to \$4.00 if he could go along. He eventually won for \$5.25. Dr. Gable purchased the services of Bill Harner and Carl Kreps for five hours each. There has been much conjecture as to his purpose for hiring them. We feel that Dr. Gable could raise even more money if he should charge admission to watch them work.

The most unusual offer was that made by the Sayres'. For the highest bidder, Dr. Sayres and his spouse promised to give a shampoo for two. During the next intermission, John Stoudt and Mrs. Bailey did the "Charleston", much to the delight of Dr. Meck.

Then Dr. Gable took over the chores of auctioneer, sporting an Irish get-up which included the most outrageous necktie this side of Dublin. After his effort, Don Stats entertained with a dignified reading of a great epic poem.

The most valuable purchase was a record (a collector's item already) of the faculty quartet and quintet. Don Ely secured this unique recording which, as J.G. pointed out, could not be found in any record shop. All the items were sold by 11 p.m. The Middlers deserve much praise for their fine display of ecumenicity, and the other members of the Seminary are to be complimented for their hearty support of the event.

April 30th was a fateful day at and for our school. The Joint Committee of the Boards, three from the Corporation and three from the Board of Visitors, with Dr. Paul C. Shumaker of Greenville, Penna. as chairman and Mr. John A. Kunz of Alexandria, Penna., as secretary, held their last meeting in their year-long quest of a successor to Dr. Meck as our Seminary President. The Corporation met in the morning and approved the committee's report and in the afternoon the Board of Visitors, whose responsibility it is to elect a president, unanimously named Professor ROBERT VERELLE MOSS, JR. Dr. Moss will assume his duties September 1, 1957. Those who know him best, his character, "spirit", and abilities are the happiest character, of all in his selection. The Joint Committee are

already at work at their next task, that of choosing his successor in the New Testament Chair. It should be known, however, especially to the Seminary family, that Dr. Moss will continue to teach some courses in that department.

April 30th was also a day of visitation by two able representatives of the work of the larger Church. Rev. Philip E. Williams, for five years an educational missionary in Japan and presently Associate Secretary of the Board of International Missions, with responsibility for Japan, Hong Kong, Equador and Iraq, spoke at the assembly, conducted the Middler Missions Class and interviewed several interested students. Mr. Loren Walters, director of Leadership Education, spoke in Dr. Gable's classes and held conferences looking toward closer co-operation between our school and the Board of Christian Education, especially regarding the work of Directors of Christian Education.

The schedule for next Fall Term was prepared before the registration on Wednesday, May 2. Changes in hours for courses may be agreed upon between professors and students, but should be reported to the Dean before becoming effective. This is necessary in order to prevent conflicts.

THE SPRING OBSERVANCE OF THE LORD'S SUPPER will be held in Santee chapel Wednesday night, May 9th, at 7:30, with Dr. Stonesifer as preacher and Dr. Bartholomew as liturgist. The offering will be for International Missions.
