FROM THE EDITOR'S DESK.....

For centuries the tradition of the Reformation has engendered in members of the Protestant Church a very unfortunate attitude. In one grand sweep the abuses and merits of Rome were thrust aside. In an attempt to eliminate the cancers of corruption in the Roman Church the reformers amputated every limb that made the Church a perfectly proportioned body designed to fill every need of its membership.

The most lamentable loss sustained in thie repudiation of everything reminiscent of Roman Catholicism was the aesthetic factor in worship. Beautiful sanctuaries, beautiful symbols, beautiful vestments, beautiful music, and beautiful services were rejected as undesirable, an action that set back Protestant Christendom entire centuries. Comparatively recent movements to restore beauty to the Protestant Church have most with a certain degree of success, but there is room for a great deal of further progress.

The philosopher Santayana, son of atheistic parents, himself an unbeliever, felt that the existence of religion was completely justified by an aesthetic principle. Religion brings beauty, and with beauty, richness and fulness into our lives. And there is no one, inside our outside the Church, who could deny the important place which beauty holds in our religion.

We should all take pride in the contribution which our Seminary is making toward engendering the need of such an element of beauty in the minds of its students. Our chapel is beautiful. The altar flowers, the candles, the music, the liturgical service — all contribute to conditioning the minds of embryo ministers to the powerful influence of the aesthetic factor. Exemplary of the effect of the aesthetic factor was the emotion engendered in everyone present at the service at which the Bach Toccata and Frague in D Linor was rendered so well in the worshipful atmosphere of a darkened chapel
