Letter to the Seminarians

From Doll, an Arable of Thrist in Miziony, Oresco

(The following are excepts of Lotters sent to Dean David Dum by Deri Troutenn, a member of last year's senior class the is not conting in Greece under the amspices of Brethron Service Somedosion. - Ed. note)

I left New York July 3rd on the Zuiderkruis, a student shir from the Holland American Line. I arrived in LeHavro, France, on the 12th. I spent two days and a sen asig whose daughter attended Beaver College in Jenkinton, Pennsylvania, last year. Then I went to World Council Meadquarters in Geneva. It was very interesting to meet some of the staff members from the various denominations. I met here a girl from Wiladelphia by the name of Pargaret Hervold who was To merly a member of Dr. Schaffer's Church. After two days in Geneva I went to Rome for two days and hence by train on down through Italy to Brindisi where I took a boat for the Greek island of Corfu and then snother boat to the mainland of Greece. I stopped at the Greek work came in Misiony for two days before going on to team headquarters in Janning.

In first three weeks in Greece were spent in visiting the villages in which the Greek team is doing its work. After this period, I was satisfied to a village of my own. The village I now work in is the very village in which the work came was held in this past

summer.

This village is a newly rebuilt village. Before the last war it had been occupied by Moslems but during the mar their homes were completely destroyed and they fled to Albenia. They were settled name leas than a year upo and are now harvesting their first crop of corn, seem of thich is a been grown from American Hybrid seed given by CROP. Some of it is very mod, but some isn't because of the lack of rain. Corn is really the staff of life for these poords, since they have very little else to eat. In spite of their circumstances, thuse poople during the past meek collected 1850kies or 526 pounds of shelled corn plus 180,000 deachang to be given to the recent earthquake victims of the islands of Greece. This may not seem like very such for forty families to give, but when you consider that they have only one acre of land per person, that this is their first crop, and that it must supply them with bread for the next twelve months, it is a large gift.

I asked, "Thy do you give this when you have need of it yourself?" They replied in chorus. When we were without food and homes the peoples of the world gave us food to eat and clothes to wear, so we feel we want to do something for these people who need help."

If our past gifts to people in distress have exceeded such a feeling of response and love for others in distress, I think we are well rewarded for our efforts. It makes dark clouds to mass away for those of us who are at times discouraged by the more undesirable conditions of our work.

I had been living in the school house, but now I live in a two-room community building which was already housing another family. This was formerly a mosque. I have the back room which requires me to go through the other people's room since there is only one do to the building. I hope this situation will soon be alleviated for the sake of the Greek refugee family as well as for my sake. The Greek family has all of their belongings including crops and machinery in their one room.

We started plowing in Riziany the week before last. Since the tractor had never been used before, we had to train two young boys as tractor drivers. They are twenty and twonty-one respectively, and both are learning very rapidly. A discouraging activity was another attempt to put the irrigation pump into operation. Although the need is over for

irrigation this summer, I want everything to be ready for meet season.

I am sure that you are well awere of our vehicle shortage, but up tatil Wednesday I had been spared ciding the Greek busses. On Wednesday I had a typical Greek bus ride. The bus was filled far beyond its intended capacity, including the alge, when we left Ioannin. but when we stopped at a village six or saidt nomads were packed in after they argued with the driver and persuaded him to allow them to come. The smell was like goats but when we got down the highway only a few kilometers the nomads became sick and the goat smell was lost among the new odor. It was my luck to have my luggage and myself well sprayed with the resulting product of their upset stomachs. I was determined to come back by motorcycle in spile of the rough mountain road which is by far too rugged to travel with three people on a motor-

Although my past week was very short in the village many things happened. Due to Riziany's warm climate, I decided to encourage the planting of fall gardens and during the past week I gave seeds to 35 our of 40 families in the village. The seeds given were radishes, turnips, beets, carrots, beas, onions, and bush beans. I hope that this will provide vegetables during the late fall for the many youth of the village who have been living on a diet which is far short of the requirements of any human being. I am very happy at the response of these people for a project which is merely an experiment. Whenever people respond like this it makes one forget about the dark valleys we are

forced to travel at times.

COMPARATIVE F DUCATION

There is a considerable difference between the school systems of the United States and of Germany. In Germany we need only 13 years until we can go to a university and do graduate studies, while you need 16 years in this country. You might think that the result of such a comparatively short training must be poor. However, if you consider our graduates, you would not think of them as being inferior. What is the reason of such speed in learning? The brains there? My nationalism does not go so far as to proclaim that. It is, in fact, the

school system.

At the age of six the child in Germany enters exementary school which lasts for only four years. After elementary school some of the children go to a "Volkeschule" for another four years. Having finished these four years there, formal education is completed and most of them onter factory work. The other group of children goes to an "Ober-schule." They are suppose to be more gifted intellectually. Some children of poor parents get schol-arships because of their talents. Since the Oberschule is no "everybody-school," it does not have to contend with the below average student. So the Oberschule, which lasts for nine years, begins its schedule immediately with one foreign language, adding a second one after three years and a third one after another three years. The average number of classroom hours per week is 35 and the summer vacation lasts only one month. All courses are required, and there are many quizzes and examinations during the year. Pupils, who can not keep in step can repeat a school year one time, but if they fail a second time they have to leave Oberschule and go to Volkschule. So the rate of learning in Oberschule is very fast, particularly because of the strict control of the learning process, which does not allow any of the academic freedoms (free choice and voluntary attendance courses), which we have later at the university. After five years, part of the students leave Oberschule and enter trade schools or business life. The remaining group passes another four years of Oberschule-training to be ready to do graduate studies at a university.
