Gregory Lecture Announced

"Mission in the 21st
Century: A View from a
Different Place" is the subject of
the annual Gregory Lecture to be
presented on Tuesday, February
6. The opening event of the
spring semester, the lecture will
be given in Santee Chapel at
11:10 a.m.by the Rev. Dr. David
Y. Hirano, executive vice
president, United Church Board
for World Ministries
(UCBWM), United Church of
Christ.

A native of Japan, Dr. Hirano was raised in Hawaii. He was conference minister in the Connecticut Conference, UCC, before assuming his present position in 1994. Dr. Hirano served as a corporate member of UCBWM since 1989. He was a member of the Joint Long Range Planning Committee which has been instrumental in developing the common ministry of UCBWM and the Christian Churches (Disciples of Christ) in the U.S. and Canada, Division of Overseas Ministries.

Established in 1987, the Gregory Lecture in world missions is named in honor of the Rev. Dr. Paul R. and Catherine H. Gregory, longtime workers in UCBWM. The lectureship is sponsored by the First Congregational United Church of Christ, Montclair,

New Jersey, where the Gregorys were members before retiring to Lancaster

Dencler Joins Seminary Staff

The Rev. Dr. Claude I. Dencler has been named vice president for Development and Seminary Relations, effective January 1. A recipient of the Master of Divinity degree from Lancaster in 1978, Claude also earned the Doctor of Ministry degree from the Seminary in 1993. Prior to seminary, he received a B.S. degree in accounting from the University of Baltimore and was a senior accountant in a national firm.

After graduation from Lancaster, Claude was pastor of Christ United Church of Christ in Danielsville, PA. From 1982 until he joined the Seminary staff, he was pastor of Hope United Church of Christ in Allentown. He has served as a stewardship associate in the Penn Northeast Conference of the UCC since 1984, assisting both clergy and laity to analyze and develop financial support for churches.

Claude has also worked with the Stewardship Council of the UCC and was treasurer of Penn Northeast Conference, overseeing the Conference's operating budget and current assets. In 1993 he received the Lancaster Seminary Alumni/ae Association's Allan S. Meck Award for Excellence in Parish Ministry.

President's Message

The new term brings us together again, and I want to welcome all. We have celebrated Christmas and a New Year, endured blizzards and floods, even found a parking space. Those traveling in the cross culture program have returned safely with much to tell us. We also welcome the new students who join us this term; their names are listed below.

On January 2 Claude Dencler joined us as vice president for Development and Seminary Relations. Claude served Hope UCC Church in Allentown for 14 years and is a graduate of the Seminary. Holocaust Studies

Arch of Fire by Siegfried Streufert describes the experiences of a child living in Nazi Germany. In short autobiographic stories, the book speaks of a childhood during the Hitler regime, the horrific experiences of a family that refused to go along with the system. The author is a professor at Pennsylvania State University College of Medicine who writes of his memories of events of his own childhood in Germany 50 years ago. SD100 - Introduction to Spirituality

In this course on spiritual formation, sometimes called ascetic or experiential theology, students will examine and experience basic themes of Christian spirituality through scriptures and readings of classical and contemporary spiritual writers. This course will explore various aspects and practices of spiritual formation: attachment and detachment, spiritual direction, meditative reading of scripture, journaling, icons, contemplative prayer and discernment. Each class will also include group interaction and retreat times to practice prayer, meditation, and spiritual friendship. This course will center on disciplines that cultivate the roots and fruits of faith and the fruits of love: community, solitude, heart and mind, service and vocation.
