



## TO ALL FELLOW SEMINARIANS:

It appears to me that clarification of values needs to be established immediately on this campus in regards to: responsibility, fortitude, and loyalty.

Responsibility is something which seems to perpetuate laxity and perhaps even fear. The proposal for disbanding the present SCC in light of the "sudden emergence of COMP" causes me to feel this way. The SCC isn't that familiar with their own power and responsibilities. I noticed this quite readily at the last meeting. Their attitude (the majority) is that (continued, next page.....etc)



of being somewhat discouraged with student moral support and participation. Well I asked how can the populus be enthusiastic about something which the "leader ship" lacks enthusiasm for? One cannot succeed without the other. A passive leadership role is no leadership at all in this particular situation. Well, to continue, the lack of responsibility seems to reach further heights of fancy by proposing that COMP be the new organization on campus. My impression received at the SCC meeting was one of uncertainty that many knew much about COMP and how it will function, etc. Therefore, what appears to me as being very irresponsible is the proposed action of a few to throw out an established, but not fully utilized, group, and turn everything over to a new committee which has been organized in the shadows with nothing more than a weak skeletal framework to operate from.

Responsibility also rests with the students to take an interest (active) in finding out just what is going on. For in the long run, we are the power to decide the destiny of SCC and COMP. Let's utilize this golden opportunity while the chance still exists.

Fortitude is another word which seems to be lacking in the minds of SCC and the rest of the community. Fortitude to try to get SCC off its blistered posterior and out doing the kinds of programs it is capable of doing. When a person becomes dormant one does not merely scratch him off the list of humanity without finding out why he is such. He is still a being of great potential - only now, strong influence must be employed to help get this person back on his feet. Well, the SCC is rather community and so if influence from leadership within this committee is non-existant, then we from without must shoulder the burden. We must try to make SCC a viable source again. Fortitude must be fervently exhibited in this case.

Third, loyalty has lost a tremendous amount of ground on campus. We are all here for the same purposes - and in conjunction with our academic endeavors - we must be together in spiritual harmony in all our activities we engage in as a community. The loyalty to each other may seem somewhat self-centered, and yet our stay at this institution is in itself a foundation upon which our remaining years will depend. This dependency can be enriched by a strong supportive community which we alone are responsible to create or destroy.

Student organizations such as SCC can solidify this loyalty among our fold effectively. However, we must be willing and able to act and react positively to the challenges which face each and everyone of us. We must be loyal to the convictions of preserving that which has the ability to unite us in our common bonds of fellowship and faith. The SCC members (officers) would do well to ponder upon this more carefully. We, as the general assembly of Seminarians must reflect upon our own intensity of concern and do something about it!

We have an organization which can do so much - yet there is much to do in lubricating this machine to make it run smoothly - that we must roll up our sleeves and begin the task immediately.

I admit I speak out of ignorance for I know little of what intricate mechanisms are involved in the body of either group; yet I fear that some would feign to act out of ignorance. And thus, my guilt in making such a speech, quickly subsides.



## THE "PROCESS"

I have received a petition from eight Seminarians to offer next year a seminar in the thought of Alfred North Whitehead. Whitehead is foundational for the contemporary movement known as Process Theology. The Educational Affairs Committee has recommended to the faculty inclusion of this seminar in the curriculum for the Spring term, 1978.

I support this petition because of personal investment in the subject and respect for the interest demonstrated in the petition. To offer such a course, however, requires some changes in other theology course offerings. I am therefore soliciting student response to the following proposed changes in theology course offerings:

(1) Drop TH 221, "Spirit, Church and Ministry," scheduled for next Fall; (2) Shift TH232, "God and Human Suffering," from Spring, 1978, to Fall, 1977; (3) add TH 237, "Seminar in Contemporary Theology: Whitehead," to the Spring, 1978, offerings; (4) repeat TH240, "Process Theology" (1 credit) during one week of the January term. TH221, the course to be dropped in this proposal, focuses on the nature of the Church and especially on theology of ministry, lay

and ordained. Discussion with faculty indicates that TH 221 duplicates material

already covered at other points in the curriculum.

Before presenting these changes to the faculty, however, I wish to give opportunity for Seminarians desiring to elect TH221 next Fall to register their interest, and similarly for any who would be inconvenienced by the switch of TH232 from Spring to Fall Term. Such response should be made to me within the next two weeks, preferably in the form of a brief written note.
