THE ENTOMBED or the LIVING CHRIST?

(The staff wishes to thank Dr. Englert for the following feature article which he wrote at our request.)

In my student days a book about the Resurrection appeared from the pen of a most unusual source, a practicing attorney. It was called, "Who Moved the Stone?" In it the author sought to test the Gospel narrative of the Resurrection by the established rules of courtroom evidence. In much the same way that modern "whodunits" build up the readers interest, he called in one by one the witnesses to these events of long ago. They were all asked the same question, "Who Moved the Stone?"

In the end the mystery was not solved, from the human standpoint. No one could be found who knew who moved the stone or saw it happen. On the other hand (and this was the author's conclusion), there is no mystery for the Christian. Only God could have moved the stone and liberated the entombed Christ.

While the witnesses proved incapable of explaining who moved the stone, there was no question why it was rolled there in the first place. It was done to ensure what wicked hands had done; to do away with Christ. What they were saying, in effect, when they rolled the stone to the entrance of the tomb, was "This is proof to the world that love fails; love gives itself but it dies and this stone is going to make sure that it stays dead!"

In every age and by every generation, stones have been rolled before the tomb in the hope that the Christ who was buried there stays entombed. In our day, it seems to me, men are bent on similar errands with similar motives. They hope to entomb Christ and keep His Spirit from ranging abroad in the world of men.

This may reveal itself in a kind of Bibliolatry, by which a particular theory of revelation lays claims on men's faith. Nowhere does the Old Testament give confirmation to what people sometimes read into the record. Nor does Jesus' attitude toward the Scriptures of His Day accord with these views.

Another stone we roll to the tomb may be creed. Fifth Century or Sixteenth Century echoes of what men once believed are held up as tests of present-day thought and convictions. We seek to entomb the Christ in the verbal forms by which the Church in particular periods of her history sought to express her faith.

Again we may hope to keep Christ entombed by rolling the stone of worshipforms to the grave. In resurrecting medieval imagery or the pageantry of the Church's compromise with the world's desire for spectacle and show, we are far from the Spirit of One who had not where to lay His head, and whose sole possession was a seamless robe.

Nor should we fail to mention the desire to entomb the Christ in highly efficient organization. In my student days it was Bruce Barton's "The Man Nobody Knows" which tried to persuade us that if Christ were alive, he would be an efficient, go-getting executive. In our time, Dan Poling thinks a certain New York preacher is the embodiment of the One who went about doing good (see his letter to the editor in a recent Reporter).

Some have sought to entomb the Christ by a reconstruction of the historical Jesus. They picture Him as a lonely rabbi, fighting and dying for a lost cause in a long ago First Century. But they leave Him there. In a way, they are saying, "We admire your courage, but don't expect us to live like that today." They admire the Jesus of 20 centuries ago but will have nothing to do with the Christ of the 20th Century. (continued: page 3)

How many have sought to entomb the Christ in a beautiful system of lumenitarian ethics? They worship Him as a good man, possibly the best man who ever lived; but still only a man. For these people He is an example, but merely an example. They honor Him as a prophet of righteousness, but because He is only an entombed prophet, none of His power to overcome the world flows into their lives.

Or how many have sought to entomb the Christ in a particular panacea for our day? They have equated the Kingdom of Herven with some particular form of government or economic system or some bit of much-needed legislation. Then, when this or that law is passed, they are content -- the Kingdom has come.

So, in one way or another, we are rolling the stones of Bible, Creed, Liturgy, Hamanism, Social Reform, or what-have-you in the the hope that the Christ who lies buried there will stay dead. But the power of God is greater than man's desire to entomb and confine His Son. Every Easter Day, yea, every day of our lives, we have new evidence that the power of God cannot be held in by the stones of men's rolling.

Whenever and wherever the power of God in Christ His Son is at work in the world, the stones are being rolled away, and the Living Christ is free to range the world of men's affairs. It may be in South Africa where the Michael Scotts and the Canon Ruddlestons are working for a peaceful alternative to a Church's Apartheid policy, or in our own Southland where men of good will are seeking a non-violent solution to the thorny problems of desegregation, or where young people give up their summer vacations to work in far off places to bring a measure of compassion to a war-torn and war-weary world. Men may seek to entoub love and good will and mercy, but they just plain refuse to stay dead. God is forever rolling stones away from entombed Christs. This is a part of what Easter means to me.
