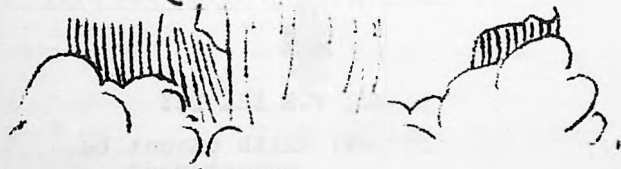

The Season of Lent

The forty days of Lent, in the Christian year, are a commemoration of Jesus' sojourn in the wilderness. Sometime during this long and lonely pilgrimage, perhaps at the end, came the temptations which are recorded in the Gospels.

Lent brings us into Holy Week. This briefer period is the commemoration of the days in Jerusalem just preceding the pitiful, glorious, saving passion of Jesus.

It is significant that both experiences served to bring home to Jesus the will of God for His life. Likewise this Lenten period may be a time in which we, as individuals, and as a church, may learn the will of God.

Lent is not merely a traditional observance but a season of personal quiet for the growth of the soul, in wisdom, and the cultivation of the spiritual life. Lenten retirement offers an opportunity to be alone with the Holy Spirit. It is a starved life that many souls, many Christian souls, live in the midst of plenty.

In the Lenten season Christ is saying again to the thoughtful, "Come ye apart . . . Learn of me . . . Some things are important, others imperative." At all times He is "nearer than hands and feet," but we are so slow to sense this nearness, when to realize it would transform all our living.

At this Lenten season let us seek Him while He may be found.
