I had resigned myself to pensive observation with respect to the growing feeling of dissatisfaction over a myriad of issues concernigh students, faculty, and administration on campus: until last weekend. I was speaking to Bruce about the possible solution to the parking situation when another member of our community joined in the discussion. Eager to incorporate a third view into our for um, I listened intently to our friend's assessment of the topic. were informed that parking on the campus of LTS, and perhaps several other issues of concern were not problems at all, for they had no reasonable solution.

Furthermore, if the energy of those concerned could be directed to- mine, were taken!
