IN RESPONSE TO ROSS ...

· To: Editor, The Seminarian... Hats off to Ross Reider for a most excellent word list in the Seminarian. I must admit to feeling the object of rather strident satire. However, at the end of the article, when the purpose became clear, I was much relieved. The intent was to help "in deciphering the verbal barrage at L.T.S...." If "deciphering" is the object, then communication is valued above the use of particular words. Mr. Reider prods us forward in the use of the vernacular. He frees us from old symbols. we can adapt our language here, we can adapt to the language of the young, the black, the poor, and the rich.

I see in the same issue of the <u>Seminarian</u> that some folks are going so far as to learn Spanish. They are transcending their cultural limits in an obvious way.

Mr. Reider encourages us to do the same on more subtle levels. Deciphering is the object. How else can we communicate our faith? Without communicating, how can we evangelize? Insistence on a particular form of communication, a particular language, a particular style with particular words is cultural arrogance. St. Paul helped


Christianity break such bounds. We could do worse than follow that example.


Enclosed is a copy of the "parable" as I have used it. I must say your source either had an excellent memory or access to one of the few printed copies in existence. (cont'd, page 4)

certain words.

You seem to think that I am opposed to saying the same things in a different way because of my cultural arrogance and provincial attitude. My position though, is that we are not saying the same things, or conveying the same meanings in different ways.

We have not replaced many of the traditional words of the faith with new and better ones, we simply avoid them because they make us uncomfortable. Others, we attach different meanings to, with the net result of a lack of communication. For each person to attach their own meanings to words like Christian, evangelism, God, etc., makes us more comfortable but it certainly doesn't help us communicate.

This process, and simple word avoidance, allows many to let others in the church to assume they believe things that they really don't. That is my concern.
