The Soviet Clergy Play 20 Questions...

An evening of conversation with four Soviet Christians was conducted at Nevin Chapel, Franklin and Marshall College last Wednesday, October 3rd, 1984 at I went in by myself, but sat with a fellow LTS student, Barron Barley. I admit my attitude was preconceived about Russian Christians and I was apprehensive. The appearance of the Soviet delegation did little to soothe me; the two older priests wore flowing black robes, crucifix necklaces, both had fashionably long dark hair and sinister beards. There was a younger priest, similarly dressed yet less menacing. The fourth delegate was a seminarian - tall, dark and handsome in a dark suit, black shirt and grey striped tie.

They each spoke in turn, beginning with the younger priest
(who was an Armenian), followed
by the older "Protopresbyter",
the "Archpriest", and finally
the seminarian. They gave a brief
statement of welcome, then the
floor was open to questions written on cards prepared by the

Soviets, Protesters, and Me: A Night I Remember

On Wednesday, October 3rd, four clergymen from the Soviet Union, whose trip was sponsored by Bridges for Peace, arrived in Lancaster for a question and answer forum in Franklin and Marshall's Nevin Chapel. They were greeted by a capacity crowd, a Channel & camera crew, and a group of loud protesters.

I was there as a person with a great lack of information about the Soviet Union, or the United States for that matter, though my self-perception is that I am more aware than the average individual In other words, I felt in no position to conclusively judge any answer given by any one of the clergymen as to its rightness, wrongness, integrity or honesty. I entered the situation feeling open and full of anxious good will

Of the clergymen, three were Russian Orthodox and one was Armenian Orthodox. Each was able to speak English on some level, though each spoke through an interpreter at some point in the discussior

Audience questions were fielde in interesting and telling ways.

The New Methodist - Mayflower Connection



This year the General Conference of the United Methodist Church voted for a dramatic change in their policy for informing their pastors that it is their time to move. No longer will ministers receive the traditional "Episcopal Greetings" from the bishop. This was seen to have been a waste of paper and postage because the letters usually ended up in the cylindrical file in the pastor's study. From now on all clargy will be notified of their moving in a unique way...all on the same day and at the same time. To accomplish this task, the United Methodist Church has contracted with the Mayflower Moving Company to send their trucks to each parsonage on the "So Long Rev, It's Been Nice Communing With Ya" list on May 1 of each year at 9:00 a.m. As the truck circles the block, ~ pastors will be given hints as to just how far away they will be going by the number of blasts on the air horn. For instance: 1 blast = next town; 2 blasts = next district; 3 blasts = another conference; 4 blasts = better beef up on the rosary. Because of this new system, all clergy will receive these "hints" in writing.

To help all United Methodist Clergy become aware of this new practice, a song has been composed for them to sing twice a day as they kneel in front of the bishop's picture. Once it is memorized, they may teach the congregation if they wish. those of you at Lancaster Seminary, here is a sneak preview of the Song:

audience. (Neither my question Nor Barron's were presented) Their answers were carefully made if not evasive.

At one point, a question was asked to the effect, "Would it be good if the Soviet leader were a Christian?" The seminarian, George, cleverly responded, "It would be good if the leaders of both of our coun-tries were Christian." This was met with applause - and laughter. The audience for the most part was not pro-Reagan. My impression was that it was a mistake to laugh at our leaders in front of foreign visitors. They were playing a game with us and we didn't know the rules. I don't think they would as readily laugh if their leader was the brunt of a joke.

Finally, questions were open to the floor. Rather than ask somethnng about Afghanistan or the KAL 007 incident, I wanted to know their theological position. "What do you believe is the Christian mission?" The one who answered my question was the Armenian. He referenced Christ's illustration of Christians as the "salt of the earth" and related this to the effort towards peace. I was dissatisfied with such a lukewarm answer and felt the need to respond, but did not. Later, I realized that the one member of the delegation that I liked and trusted most (based on initial appearances) was this Armanian who answered my question. His reference had scriptural basis and though modest, was reassuring in that salt does not lose its taste.

There was a question about the Pentacostal family that had been living in the U.S. Embassy in Moscow. The Soviets admitted that they had heard about the incident, but did not know enough to comment. I feel confident that this is correct. My primary concern was the suspicion that the Christian church in the

Questions concerning Christian rights and Christians who are imprisoned "due to the practice of their faith" were handled on the basis of the constitution and a seemingly Lutheran approach to Christians in society. The Soviet Constitution was cited to proclaim that Christians have the same rights as any other person in the USSR, and that each person is treated equally under the law. The Lutheran view, in my eyes, (I don't even know if they know Luther), came out in the idea that action deemed Christian by the Church is limited to those actions which are legal under Soviet law, so that the law (Soviet law) dictates what Christian action is and is not (in effect). According to this view, civil law must be obeyed to preserve order and safety. The Russian Orthodox Bishop said that it is remarkable how when someone is jailed, they suddenly turn "Christian". suppose he was saying that these criminals turn Christian to gain both Eastern and Western sympathies. It was also remarkable that they could cite a few cases where U.S. criminals could be called 'political prisoners."

On matters concerning foreign affairs, especially the arms race and the Afghan War, all they reall can say is what their historic experience has been and what information the Soviet government has given them. The clergymen know that the Soviet and Eastern block peoples want and even crave peace. They further believe that the reason the Soviet Union is in Afghanistan is because they were invited, asked for help....a statement which seems not to be They seem to be satisfied with their government's approach in the face of their perception of our approach.

What is most telling about thes answers to questions, is that information does not flow freely either in the U.S. or the USSR, that it is easy to manipulate

Soviet Union is being used as an instrument of that government. By inference, however, I venture to say that the Christian Clergy are suspect by that same government. They have to watch what they say and the temptation to parrot government policy is

undoubtedly present.

Nevertheless, they represent tho official Christian Church in the Soviet Union, and the government would have gotten rid of them a long time ago if they could have. Christianity is still a viable force to be reckoned with (as events in Poland attest to). The danger that it becomes an organ of the state, as in the case of Nazi ' Germany, is real. There is hope if people are reading scripture and understanding it (as I hope the Armenian is doing).

As Barron and I were leaving F&M, we ran into a group protesting the presence of the Soviet clergy. The group was sponsored by a fellow named McIntire of the International Council of Christian Churches. They had signs inscribed with Freeze Now, Fry Later" and similar slogans, At one point, there was a near confrontation between a protestor and a student who tried to take his megaphone~ loudspeaker away. This was broken up by a campus security guard using a city ordinance against noise as his authority.

Several discussions ensued thereafter, significantly less heated, but still emotional. After about an hour and a half, there was still a handful of people talking, representing different groups - protesters, students and faculty. there was less of a desire to assert one's opinion over the other and more of a openness to seek the truth. Time will tell what changes in attitudes have taken place.

popular judgement through the selective use of honest information, and that it is unfair for us to ask questions and expect answers that are as direct or full as we would like. We might see it as unfair, too, if we had been in vited to visit the Soviet Union and then were expected to answer questions in the style that they thought appropriate.

Some questions raised by the audience were also telling. I'll mention the one that sticks out It was, "Do you think in my mind. it would be better if your leader (political) were a Christian like President Reagan is?" The response was,"We wish both leaders were

hristian."

Following the forum, another LTS student and I began a conversation with the demonstrators who were outside the chapel on College Avenue. My intention was to learn from the protesters as well. of the protesters naver entered into conversation because their sole purpose was to give a message that basically said, "don't trust these four clergymen because they are just another part of the Soviet-Communist imperial plot." As these people proclaimed their Christianity they also condemned Christianity in the Soviet Union.

Personally, I am disheartened by both the message sent by Moscow and by the message sent by the group of protesters, because neither will accept the other until the other becomes one of them. Yet at the same time I rejoice in the four Soviet clergymen and the one protester that did converse long into the night, for in these cases there was an attempt to accept in love and to live in the newness of life, the chance that gives hope to which each is called.

PORNOGRAPHY AWARENESS WEEK

October 27 to November 4 has been declared "Pornography Awareness Week" by the National Federation for Decency. Pornography is a growing problem in America and its circulation and content is almost totally out of control. It is time for every decency-loving Christian to get informed and get involved in the battle against the unbridled and illegal tidal wave of pornography spreading across our nation.

The Chaplain of the U.S. Senate, Dr. Richard C. Halverson, issued the following urgent call to action on October 1st of this year:

"History is replete with evidence that no great empire was defeated from without before it had disintegrated spiritually, morally and ethically from within. The Roman Empire certainly did not collapse for lack of military power. It was fatally vulnerable to the fierce forces without because of its materialism, its hedonism and self-indulgence, its amoral, permissive social decay within. America, the strongest nation in history, will be destroyed not by forces from without but from its own decadence. The need is critical for the people to take a stand against those forces which are contributing to the pollution, corruption and moral decay of American life. There is a story of a little boy who came running excitedly into his mother's bedroom when the hall clock chimed 13. "Mother" he shouted, "it is later than it has ever been before!" It is later than we think!"

THE FACTS

***Pornography is an \$8 billion annual business.

***There are an estimated 20,000 adult bookstores in the U.S.-that's more than the number of MacDonald's fast food outlets!
***Over 900 X-rated movie theaters operate in the U.S.

***Almost every major city has a "dial-a-porn" phone number that is accessible to young children.

***Cable television pumps pornographic movies into homes which can be viewed by children.

***State police in Michigan found that pornography is used or imitated in 41% of the sex crimes they investigate.

***Sex crimes have been committed by children as young as eight years old.

***Victims of pornography have been as young as eight months old.

THE STUDIES

***Researchers at the University of Wisconsin and UCLA have found exposure to pornography, particularly sex linked to violence, motivated some 35% of male viewers to violent acts against women.

***A November 1983 study by Larry Baron and Murray Strauss found that "readership of...sex literature is highly correlated with rape". In fact, FBI data shows that one of every three 12-year-old girls in the U.S. will be sexually assaulted in her lifetime.

***Dr. Victor Cline of the University of Utah stated four effects of repeated viewing of violent sexual presentations: (1) stimulates and arouses aggressive and sexual feelings, especially

in males; (2) shows and instructs in detail HOW to do the acts; (3) the acts are, in a sense, legitimized by repeated exposure; and (4) there is increased likelihood the individual will act out what he has witnessed.

***Dr. Shirley O'Erien, University of Arioona Human Development Specialist, estimates as many as 600,000 children-boys and girls as young as 3 years old and as old as 18, but mostly 10- to 16-year-olds-are kidnapped, seduced, sexually molested and photographed to produce "child pornography."

While most Christians are quick to express disapproval of the use of prinography for themselves, too many are slow to get involved in the public battle to curb and control its availability. Influenced by false and deceptive arguments against censorship and for free speech, these well-intending people become part of the problem rather than part of the solution!

Every Christian who fails to take a stand against the current obscenity scene in our society is supporting that situation by silent consent. Until our lawmakers know we want a clean community rather than a prrnography polluted one, they will assume that we do not care.

The Pornography Awareness Week Calendar of Events has some ideas listed through which you can take a stand and get involved. A copy of a suggested letter to the President regarding pornography is also included for your information.
