### SUMMER STATE PARK CHAPLAINCY OPPORTUNITIES

The Pennsylvania Council of Churches is looking for some students who might be available for summer ministry in



one of 22 Pennsylvania State parks. Summer campground ministry is a great opportunity to test and develop skills in worship,

preaching, pastoral visitation and management while enjoying ecumenical ministry.

Full-time chaplains are paid \$3,100.00, and half-time chaplains are paid \$1,1550.00. They are reimbursed for mileage in performance of the ministry and provided with housing and utilities if they live away from home.

Persons about to graduate and begin the process of seeking a pastoral position in the United Church of Christ are required to prepare a profile. Copies of the packets are available from the Office of Contextual Education.

On December 16, anyone interested in learning about the best ways to complete a profile and to circulate it effectively are invited to meet with the Rev. Felix Carrion, from the national staff of the Office for Church Life and Leadership, the instrumentality which circulates profiles and administers the placement process for the denomination. His title is minister to the Middle Atlantic Region and for the Ministry of the Laity. His office is in Collegeville, PA. He will be here on Wednesday, December 16, and will meet with you from 1:00 until 3:00 or so to give his advice about profile preparation and protocol and to answer your questions. ### Advent and the New World Order

When the Iron Curtain came down in Eastern Europe, followed by the collapse of the Soviet Union, we experienced the end of the old world order. I use such a phrase because we are now supposed to be in the new world order. The old world order was characterized by radical polarization of East and West, the fear of nuclear holocaust, the alternation of hostile and friendly relations between the superpowers, and the rest of the world choosing sides and/or even engaging in smaller struggles of power (cf. the Falkland Island War).

The new world order usually refers to an alternative structure, but is yet to be realized. Instead, the world order that has emerged out of the end of the Cold War is not much different. In fact it may be worse, since there appears to be no order at all. The number of wars appears to be increasing. terrorism and political violence continue, the world AIDS epidemic is getting worse (some project that certain African nations will lose up to 30% of their populations), and starvation is relentless in such places as There is also an increase of Somalia. racial, religious and ethnic prejudice, resulting in open violence (e.g., in the U.S., Germany, Great Britain and Yugoslavia).

If all of this is not enough to arouse sympathy or moral outrage, add the suggestion that we are now in a new world order. The very thing so obviously lacking is order of any kind, let alone a world order, and especially one that is new. It sounds like the four horsemen of the apocalypse.

We need to free ourselves of the illusion

that these events are recent or the result of the current administration in Washington. American foreign policy for 40 years has been based on the twin principles of military threat and economic/political advantage. In theoretical terms this is called political realism. The polite and seemingly neutral expression of this view is that we must operate according to national interests. The blunt form is simply: "What's in it for us?" When you add to such realism the notion of short-term planning and payoffs, then the only thing that concerns political realism is short-term military and economic gains.

I venture such frankness, the week after Thanksgiving and the first week of the cultural festival of happiness called Christmas, because it is the only way I can explain the current situation, which cries out for a new world order. How else do you explain the disinterest and passivity to the rape, killing and torture in Yugoslavia, the hundreds of thousands starving in Somalia, the killing of nuns in Africa, or the violence in our own country? What drives me to repentance is that such world disorder is not an accident, but the inevitable consequence of our operating principles.

Which brings us to Advent. This is not the first week of Christmas, but the first week of a month of hope. If you cannot think of anything for which to hope, read the papers. This is not a time to scoff at the idea of a new world order, but a time to pray for it, hope for it and work for it. It is a time to admit that we do not have it, that we are not even close and that major changes will be required if we expect to see even its beginnings. But alas, given our track record you wonder if it is possible. Advent is not only a test of our imagination, it is a test of our faith. Advent means believing in a seemingly impossible new world order because of that One who makes all things possible. Peace.

#### LIBRARY NEWS




