SPOTLIGHT ON GERMANY



#### 4. THE IRON CURTAIN

In July, 1951, a friend of mine and been in Berlin at the German Evangelcal drurch Congress, where nearly 500,000 of our divided country had borne witness to their anity in Christ. We were now fraveling back through the Soviet Zone to Goettingen in Western Germany, where I studied at that time. In a train not very far from the Iron Curtain we became acquainted with a student of physics from in the Soviet Zone, He wore the blue uniform shirt of the "FDJ," the com-

There were about five medals on his chest, showing that he was one of the few enthusiastic followers of the regime. He told us quite frankly, though in a friendly manner, that he was a convinced communist, materialist, atheist, and cared nothing for the Christian faith. (CONTINUED: page 3)

We told him about the wonderful experiences we had had at the Church Congress. After some time we asked him if he didn't know of the restrictions on freedom set by his government. We thought that he would deny them strongly; but we were surprised, as he became very uneasy and admitted that he was very scared by the method of the regime. It is important to know that he was just going to pass over, illegally, to Western Germany, in order to pilot a group of West German communist teen-agers into the Soviet Zone for an international youth rally.

Inspite of this he told us a story to illustrate how scared he sometimes felt. Some months ago he had gone to Berlin to meet a West German friend at a square in the Soviet sector. Talking to his friend, he suddenly recognized that a man wearing a badge of the SED (Communist Party) was observing his conversation, and then speaking secretly to a policeman. "As I realized that," said our friend, "I became very fearful, said 'good bye' to my friend hastily, and fled as fast as it was advisable from that part of town."

Meanwhile, we had reached the last station before the Iron Curtain and had to go about one mile to the Soviet Zone's frontier guardhouse. It was just midnight and only the stars were shining. The frontier guard looked at our luggage and, seeing my camera, politely asked whether or not there was an exposed film in it. When I couldn't help but admit that there was, he at first demanded that I leave it there; but then he said, "Give the film to this 'Jugendfreund' (the members of the FDJ call each other by this name). He may develop it and, if there is no objection, send it to you."

No sooner than we had left the frontier guardhouse the 'Jugendfreund' gave the film back to me, trying to repress laughter. While we went together towards the frontier guardhouse on the West German side, I wondered how our friend would manage it, trying to get into West Germany without a passport. On the way he took off his glittering uniform shirt and put it into his satchel.

It was 12:45 am, and it had become a bit foggy. When we arrived at the West German guardhouse a sleepy customs-official asked us to enter the house for the formalities of an inspection. He didn't recognize at first that only two of the visitors accepted his invitation. Our 'Jugendfreund' had taken this opportunity to walk over the frontier and disappear into the fog. Of course, we didn't know anything about it, when we were asked by the official about "the third man." Perhaps, because we were theologians or because he didn't mind the illegal frontier-passing, the customs-official believed our story and let us go in peace.

After we had walked along some hundred yards, our friend suddenly appeared from out of the misty darkness; and we laughed heartily at our nice adventure. At a crossing we had to part. He asked for our addresses and promised to write. We said a "Gott be Johlen" (God bless you); and he thanked us for this wish. Unformmately, we didn't put down his name and address.

We have never heard anything from our 'Jugendfreund' during these past three years. There is no chance to get his address. I wonder what has happened to him... Please, pray for him... God knows his address...
