

LATEST CONSTRUCTION

On the average American seminary campus 60% of the students are married. Lancaster Seminary is no exception. One of the reasons for this is that a significant number of older men with families who have established themselves in other fields are answering the call to the ministry and are returning to school. In order to provide more adequate quarters for married students and in order to make them more fully a part of the seminary community, the Corporation has undertaken the construction of apartment buildings which will house from thirty to forty married students and their families. These new buildings should be completed by March 1, 1960.

Lancaster Theological Seminary

PURPOSE

Lancaster Seminary is a graduate school of theology which serves the church by training men and women for church vocations and by seeking a deeper understanding of the meaning and implications of the Christian faith.

CHURCH RELATIONSHIP

It is the oldest theological school of the Evangelical and Reformed Church and one of the fourteen seminaries related to the United Church of Christ. Normally, however, about twenty-five per cent of its students are from other denominations. In addition, students from five or six other countries are members of the Lancaster Seminary community.

ACCREDITATION

The Seminary has been an accredited member of the American Association of Theological Schools from the time of the adoption of the Association's accrediting system in 1938. The Department of Christian Education was accredited in 1955 by the American Association of Schools of Religious Education.

LOCATION

The Seminary is located in the small metropolitan city of Lancaster, Pennsylvania, in the midst of one of the nation's leading farm areas. Thus it has access to both the urban and the rural church and seeks to enable its students to serve both. The campus of the Seminary adjoins the campus of Franklin and Marshall College. This fact greatly extends the faculty and library resources of the Seminary.

DEGREES CONFERRED

The degrees of Bachelor of Divinity and Master of Religious Education are granted to candidates who fulfill the necessary requirements. Applicants for admission to the Seminary must be graduates of accredited four-year colleges with the Bachelor's degree.

THE EXPANSION PROGRAM

In 1957 the Boards and Faculty of the Seminary adopted a long-range development program which calls for an increase in enrollment from 90 to 120 within the next five years, and from 90 to 150 within the next ten years; the addition of two new chairs to the faculty; and the expenditure of one million dollars for student apartments, new li-

brary wings, and increased office and classroom space. It is anticipated that the enrollment will reach 100 in 1959-60. A new chair in Pastoral Theology will be added to the faculty in 1959-60. The Seminary is also conducting two experimental schools during the summer of 1959: (1) A School of Theology for Laymen of the United Church in co-operation with the lay agencies of the Church; and (2) A School for Ministers on Sabbatical Leave in co-operation with the Commission on Church and Ministry and the Board of National Missions.


