GUIDELINES FOR THE TIMES

I would like to address this article to the subject of dealing effectively with the times that we live in. Here at seminary we are taught a great deal about theology so that we are given a good grasp on the expression of faith in God which we can pass on to others as we start our ministry. But what about the times that we live in: How do we become relevant to the everyday needs of the people that we minister to?

The times that we live in are very uncertain, and they give to us a great sense of insecurity. Things are in a great state of change in which what might appear to be a good solution today will be irrelevant tomorrow. I am going to propose some of my ideas for dealing with the times that we live in.

First-We must develop constructive and productive solutions rather than turning to destructive solutions. Second: We must concentrate on meeting the basic survival needs of man. This can be accomplished by organizing on the community level. Third: We must emphasize the concepts of cooperation and sharing. Fourth: We must learn to live in the present. Christ said that each day's concerns are sufficient for working on in one day.

I an still looking for the answers to this problem of dealing with the uncertainty of our times. The list I have given is not a complete list. But I think that the ideas that I have proposed will give guidelines and cut through the

FROM THE EXECUTIVE CABINET

The Executive Cabinet met on October 30, 1974 and the following actions were taken:

- 1. Received a report from Dr. Glasse concerning his meeting with non-resident seminarians, and accepted his recommendation that:
 - a. The Executive Cabinet allocate additional space in the Student Union Building to the SCC for use as a center for off-campus students;
 - b. The knotty pine room adjacent to the pool room be designated as a center for off-campus students;
 - c. The SCC Standing Committee work out with the Business Manager and the Hub manager an acceptable plan for access to, use of, and maintenance of that space;
 - d. This allocation of space be for the period November 1 December 20, 1974; and
 - e. The situation be reviewed on or before December 10 by the SCC, and suggestions and proposals be presented to the Executive Cabinet at its meeting on December 11, 1974.
- 2. Received a challenge from 7 seminarians (dated 10/22/74) to the decision on CPE credit and fees (Register October 17, 1974) and initiated the following process for consultation and review:
 - a. Copies of the petition were sent to members of the Executive Cabinet and to Professor Irion.
 - b. President Glasse will invite the petitioners to meet with Dean Bricker and Prof. Irion to clarify the implications of the policy decision.
 - c. If there are still objections or suggestions for revision, these will be referred back to the Executive Cabinet for decision.

The next meeting of the Cabinet will be on Wednesday, November 6, at 8:00 A.M. in room L216.
