# EDUCATIONAL LIFE COMMITTEE MEETS

At the December 6 meeting of the Educational Life Committee, Associate Dean Proffitt presented the slate and schedule of course offerings for 1993-94 for review. The general policy is to continue to offer required courses on Tuesday through Thursday (an exception for next year is

EM100, with plenary session on Monday evening). Feedback on the necessity of this effort is solicited.

There was discussion of the best time to offer courses that might appeal to local clergy. Professor Huwiler will ask the Alumni/ae Council to discuss and advise the committee.

Faculty members on the committee updated others on the faculty curriculum revision discussions. Tasks for Educational Life in spring will depend on the progress made in those discussions during the rest of December.

Other issues discussed but not concluded include academic honors and grade point average and the appropriate number of credits for PLI02.

### PROFESSOR STRAYER TO PERFORM AT NATIONAL CATHEDRAL

Professor Gene Paul Strayer, Santee Chapel organist, will be playing a recital at Washington National Cathedral on Sunday, January 2, at 5:00 p.m. The recital follows the Service of Evensong at the Cathedral. 
#### LANCASTER SEMINARY FOOD BANK


This week we completed the final editing of the Self-Study for the decennial review. After many, many meetings with people on campus, and further review with officers of the Board, a final edition of the document was prepared. It will be sent to the agency offices and the five-member review team this week. Copies will also be available for faculty and administration later. A copy will be placed on reserve in the library. Don Cooney, Vice President for Development and Seminary Relations, has edited the report. He deserves our praise and gratitude for weeks of work in organizing and revising the report. This was a major task since materials came from several committees, a long list of data and documents needed to be found, and the report had to be accepted by all segments of the seminary community. Don was assisted by Karen McKinnis and Barbara Stephens in editing the document, and we thank them as well. So now we prepare for the visit on Feb. 20-24. After the first of the year information on the visit and process will be published.

Our Dean, David Greenhaw, will be on sabbatical from January through June. The entire Greenhaw family will travel to Sydney, Australia, where Leigh Greenhaw will teach, David will study and write, and the boys will attend school. In his absence, Associate Dean Anabel Proffitt will assume responsibility for the Dean's Office. She will serve as Acting Dean, with full authority to act on David's behalf. I will assist her in whatever way I can, since she will continue to have her own responsibilities. Dean Greenhaw has prepared many things in advance of his leave; other things will be handled through normal procedures. Rev. Ann Schoup and Mr. Jay Ellison have been meeting with a representative group of resident students to discuss matters pertaining to life on campus. Large and small issues have been raised, and many have been dealt with by staff. Having Richards Hall open to our students without college students has been a new experience. There are obviously many things about the building that need improvement, which is why major renovation is planned. In this interim period we appreciate the patience of the residents. We will try to do all we can to improve the situation. Jay Ellison has also devised a plan for the use of Mayer Commons during the evenings, which involves a change in the locks and the assistance of students. Kevin Fruchtl has assisted in this plan, and it will allow for extended hours in that building.

These are a few of the things happening this term. We have also welcomed new staff (Ann Kemper, Pat Otto, Ginjr Humphries, and Donna Kaplan) and look forward to the arrival of Lee Barrett, new Professor of Theology, in January. Joy and peace to all.
