## "Trust? or walls?"

"whoever would save his life will lose it, and whoever loses his life for my sake will find it." (at. 16:25).

It seems to me, that seminaries have few things in common, but one of the major points that is common, is that they are comprised of people. The people themselves seem to have little in common outside of an aspiration to a ministry in the Church of God, and learning towards that end.

There does however, seem to be a possession in common, they all have "WALTED". Walls behind which they hide themselves, walls to shield and protect them. For some, the walls also serve as a personal fortress from within which they launch their forays into life--rarely travelling too far from the protection, but far enough to hit, then scurry back to

cafety.

dalls vary in thickness and construction according to the needs of their builders. They vary from paper thin to adamantine rock. The quality that walls have in common is that they are opaque. Walls are intended to exclude light, and herein lies our common tiny constructin fault. When we make our walls opaque, we build in a peculiar opacity in that it is a one way thing, we exclude light intentionally, but do so in such a way that our walls become invisible to our own eyes. We can see the world about us, but can't see the walls we have made to separate us from it. We can't see our own walls. In many cases we don't even realize that they exist until we crash against them in effort to get out. Its even worse when someone tries to get in and love us, then has to back away, burised, hurt, bewildered, not understanding why.

The problem with our walls is that they work in two directions, not only do they deep hurt out, they also keep it in. They hinder us, they stop us from forming relationships, not only with people, but also with our God, for our walls are specifically made to exclude <u>might</u>, remember? Walls hem us in and baulk us when we sould like, Oh! so very much, to get out and see for ourselves just what it means to live as a

free fully human person.

We build our walls intentionally, if unconsciously, we build them to ward off hurts and threats both known and unknown, both real and unred. Lone we built way back in our cradle days, some when we were in our "growing up" process. It is quite probable though, that some of our strongest walls were built after we assumed we were "grown up". Walks are built so easily, well its easy for an expert, and we are experts in this field, after all, we have been doing it all our lives. Besides we were taught by experts—our parents, their parents, — relations, neighbours, the church, all have added something to our own expertixe, just as we do for them, including our own children.

Yes, we all have walls, strong strong walls, walls which, if anything are made stronger when a frontal assault is made to breach them. Malls cannot be broken down, but they can be made to disappear, to cease to exist, to be made to become as though they had never been. There is only-one quality against which no wall can prevail, an element of human life which causes their annihilation. That element is TRULT. Trust, which if followed by other human qualities, leads to the ultimate of

LOVE and ACCEPTANCE, both of others, and self.

Before a person can rid self ow walls, that person needs to learn the means of trust. Once that is learned, other qualities have a chance to follow. Trust however, will not come until and unless the wallmaker sees a need for relationships. The need for warmth, companionship, for love, cannot be imposed from outside the walls, only from within: Trust

has to be wanted, and in such a way as to be prepared to pay whatever costs are involved. If not, the walls which remain and the hife of the builder will remain the stunted, and unfree and lonely existence it has been, and will remain until the motivation to trust does arise.

If and when the motivation does arise, it will probably be because of something goen in another person, perhaps freedom. Ferhaps the first move may be a question: "What has that persongot that I would like to have in me?" In the search for an answer to this question it is conceivable that it will be seen that the other lives a life of relationships, both with people, and with Jod, - that is, the Christ life.

If this occurs, and the Christ event becomes the motivation for trusting, then trust will come, and come abundantly. There will be no need to seek it out as a deliberate action, for the wallmaker-now the free seeker, will find trust and the qualities which follow it in the course of just living his freedom, being people, listening, hearing,

charing, loving, becoming.

All of this is possible to one who is prepared to trust him or her imesself to be vulnerable, who is prepared to be weak and defenceless, who is prepared to die to the old system of existence, and to seek out into a now and different possibility. This is resurrection, and in Christ, that resurrection is assured, even to me.
