1994-95 FINANCIAL AID

For some time, all of us have been aware that there would be changes in the scholarship program beginning with the first semester of 1994-95. Since many of you have a high interest in the subject, the following information will be of interest to you.

Continuing students will find minimal changes in policy. The following principles will continue:

- Scholarship recipients must be fulltime students in the Master of Divinity program. Fulltime is 12 credits per semester up to a maximum of 94 credits. Your last semester fulltime is the number of credits needed to complete your degree.
- Every student wishing to be considered for financial aid must submit a Financial Aid Application on or before April 15. Attach a signed and dated copy of your 1993 Income Tax Return (1040, 1040A, 1040EZ). Lancaster Seminary Financial Aid Applications will be available in the Student Services Office and should be submitted to Shirley Laukhuff when completed.

- Every applicant must assure that there is a copy of his/her Judicatory Sponsorship form in the Financial Aid file. See Shirley.

- Every applicant must have a letter or certificate from the appropriate judicatory agency indicating that the student is acknowledged as appropriate in their mind for studies in preparation for the practice of ministry. See Shirley.

The changes that affect continuing students are:

- Coursework during the summer will be considered to be part of the second semester financial aid award.

- Awards will be made on the basis of dollar amounts rather than percentages.

- Applications which are submitted late, require us to follow up because attachments are incomplete, unsigned, etc., will be considered as though they are new applications and will be subject to the new guidelines (see below).

- Students who are currently enrolled, but not receiving scholarship or the UCC scholarship grant will be subject to the new guidelines (see below).

New Financial Aid Guidelines

In the 1994-95 year, UCC grants for incoming students will no longer be made only on the basis of being "in care" of the church and ministry committee of their association. Readiness for graduate study and financial need will be among the criteria considered. Based on these factors, grants at 100 percent, 75 percent and 50 percent of tuition will be available. Grants in varying amounts will also be available for non-UCC students.

Because of the increase in applications, all applications will be reviewed on specific dates:

- applications for aid are due by April 15 for the fall semester and by November 15 for the spring semester.

All documents required by continuing students are also required of new applicants. All first time UCC applicants must be "in care" of the church and ministry committee of their association or provide a written plan which assures completion of the process. Non-UCC applicants must have the judicatory sponsorship which is appropriate for their denomination or provide a written plan which assures completion of the process.

All applicants who are changing denominations must have the denominational sponsorship of the new judicatory (church and ministry committee/endorsing agency) complete before they will be eligible for Eancaster Seminary Financial Aid.


SIGN UP FOR STEWARDSHIP WORKSHOP
