definition of sin is not that we blow up a city with bombs, but that we want our own freedom rather than being submissive to Yahweh. The Christian faith asserts that man must be radically submissive to God almighty instead of trying to get "radical freedom" as you, Mr. Schreck, want. Without a recognition of Original Sin, there is no need for Jesus Christ. Maybe you would want him a mere example. But then that does not explaing why Jesus had to die. Maybe he was just deranged, in which case you must throw cut Christ as an example and also stop calling yourself a Christian at which I might agree.

To conclude, I would like to defend the Calvinistic tradition which is within the Christian faith. Do not brand the systematic theology of John Calvin and his admirers as absurd. If you read John Calvin in his primary source, the Institutes, instead of through secondary books and professors you may learn to at least respect a different outlook. You shold have learned this respect from the sister religion of Unitarianism, i.e. Hinduism, John Calvin believed that man is a free agent, that he is responsible for his action and that he is capable of evil and good. He believed in predestination, but the term double predestination is his critic's terminology. Predestination is predestination, either God predestines or he does not, no double or triple or quadruple predestination. Predestination does not mean the hopelessness or automation of fatalism. Mr. Schreck, you should investigate Calvin's idea of the secondary free agent to understand predestination more clearly.
