President's Page

This week marks important events in our centennial celebration. On Wednesday we welcome members of the city of Lancaster to our campus for an open house. The guests are members of the county Chamber of Commerce. As a school with deep roots in this county, we are pleased to host this reception. The reception will be from 5-7 p.m. Please note that we will probably have between 100 - 200 guests touring Lark, the Schaff Library and the Refectory.

On Thursday and Friday, we hold our spring Board meeting, which will include a special celebration Thursday evening for faculty, staff, trustees, and donors. The evening will culminate in a service in Santee Chapel marking the centennial of our campus.

The board committees will meet on Thursday afternoon, with the plenary session of the Board on Friday morning. Each committee will of course attend to its own business and then report the next morning. Of special note on the agenda are the following issues:

- 1. A revision in the By-laws of the Board, removing the stipulation of a maximum of six trustees who are members of other denominations than the United Church of Christ. We have a large board, consisting of 36 members. We have 18 trustees appointed by church bodies. The other 18 are elected by the Board itself. The leadership of the Board sees no need to limit non-UCC members to six.
- 2. There will be special reports by the Development Office on progress toward the Campus 100 goals. We currently have several grant proposals out to foundations and others are in preparation. We are also working with many individuals regarding direct gifts or planned gifts.
- 3. The Education and Student Life Committee has received recommendations from the faculty, the Dean and myself regarding the tenure and promotion for Richard Berg and Frank Stalfa. These recommendations are based on their positive contributions to the Seminary over the past five years.
- 4. The Education and Student Life Committee will also take action on a procedure in the event of sexual assault developed by the Worship and Campus Life Committee. This procedure has had discussion on campus with faculty and administration, and now goes to the Roard
- 5. We have presented to the Business Committee of the Board a budget for FY95 which incorporates major changes in our expenses. We began by reducing the FY94 expenses by \$200,000. This involved changes in our financial aid policy for new students, several reductions in personnel and general reductions across the board in program budgets. On the revenue side the proposed budget includes a 6% increase in tuition and 5% in housing. It projects enrollment in a very conservative way and also reduces our expectation for gifts and grants, in light of recent experience. The budget also includes a \$40,000 contingency line, in order to give us more protection from unpredictable changes in both revenue and expenses. In the last three years we have experienced deficits because certain costs exceeded our estimates and certain income lines fell below estimates. In the past ten fiscal years, this budget represents the most serious attempt to reduce expenses. Our expectation is that by undergoing this type of fiscal planning we will bring expenses more in line with our actual revenue. It has been a difficult process and it obviously entails the deferment of many expenses which are to be directed toward achieving goals in our planning process. At the same time it has to be recognized that one of our goals is to have a balanced budget and to eliminate the use of reserves to operate the current fund. After so many years of deficits, these reserves are depleted and we simply must take steps to produce a budget that ends in a surplus.
- 6. As part of the change in personnel, Professor Allen Kroehler will continue as Chaplain as a volunteer. Professor Kroehler is currently on a half-time position and has agreed that it is time to take one more step in providing more freedom for himself and his family. He came to the Seminary in 1968 and is the senior member of our faculty. During these years he has been a Professor of Christian Education, Director of the Field Education program, Dean of the Chapel and Chaplain. In all of these roles, Allen has demonstrated his love of people. He has natural gifts for counseling and caring for those about him. Even in times when he was not the official chaplain, everyone knew that Allen was a person that one could seek out for nurture and assistance. In recent years he has assisted us in welcoming Belva Brown Jordan as the new Director of Field Education. This has allowed him to take up the role of Chaplain and Dean of the Chapel. I am glad that he will continue to be a part of this community next year. I am also pleased to announce that Allen will be the preacher for the Service of Word and Sacrament on Commencement Day, May 14.
- 7. Finally, leaders of the Board and the administration will report on the ATS/Middle States review process. This will include a review of the final report, which we now have received, as well as reflections on the implications of all of this for the life of the Seminary. As you recall, we received the best possible recommendation from the visiting team. The team recommended that the two notations from the previous review be removed, full reaccreditation for ten years and a set of requests for written reports in two years regarding key issues in the life of the school. We have accepted the report without objection, affirming the assessment by the visiting team in its affirmations as well as its articulation of issues which must be addressed. This discussion at the Board meeting will begin the process for the Board to deal with the issues raised by the report and adjust our plans over the next few years so as to develop a positive plan of action.
