BIBLE STUDY

"Is it lawful on the Sabbath to do good or to do harm, to save life or to kill?" Mark 3:4

Ernst Kasemann tells the story of a Dutch congregation meeting in emergency to decide whether to make urgently-needed repairs on a nearby dike on the Sabbath. The predictable arguments were advanced: God has given no "killing" is involved if healing the commandments to be obeyed under all circumstances; life is obedience to His will; He can still the threatening waters. Finally the pastor suggested mildly that in fact Jesus himself had violated Sabbath law in the interest of healing and meeting life's necessities. At that one venerable gentleman rose and said, "I have always been troubled, Pastor, by something that I have never yet ventured to say publicly. Now I must say it. I have always had the feeling that our Lord Jesus was just a bit of a liberal."

Labels aside, the old gentleman had come to a perception of Jesus that is completely consistent with the * * gospel portrait and true (even) to what historians declare about the historical Jesus. Nothing is more characteristic of the man, nothing more central to his ministry, than his surpassing autonomy vis-a-vis the honored customs and traditions of society and even the divine commands themselves. In a word, Jesus was free.

But not only did the Dutch gentleman see Jesus aright, he was also right to be troubled--just a little bit offended -- by the Jesus he saw.

There's little doubt where Jesus would have been on that stormy day beside the sea. Perhaps the source of the trouble lies in the way Jesus . puts the question to his oppents (Mark 3:4). He poses an uncompromising either-or where our Dutch friend would much prefer to seek accomodation. Surely one is not "doing harm" in conserving the traditions that have served society so well. Surely takes a little holiday.

. . . And is it so?

Are we followers (terrified to be sure) of a Lord whose attitude toward, and use of, the traditions of men is creative, rather than conserving? Does this following lead to the cross, where the traditions of men (in all the rich panoply of their institutional sanctions) work their way --and are overcome? Are we following a Lord who was just a bit of a liberal? That is, just a bit creative? Just a bit free?

CHRISTIANITY AS WATERGATE

In the responses to my articles published in The Seminarian, several of my classmates suggested, no-invited, no-subtly told me that now that I've said my piece I ought to have the decency to shut up, and kiss and make friends again. In their words "it is time to realize and accept, without undue criticism and comment on these differences, and to appreciate them in a positive sense." Wrongo, Gang! You see, we're not talking here about differing styles of ministry, because I will readily admit the virtues of diversity and differing individual talents and skills. What we're dealing with is the basic tenets of authentic Christianity - the teachings of our leader, Jesus Christ. Jesus taught us to work and to sacrifice to improve the lot of the poor, the suffering and the oppressed. Jesus never called Christians into a comfort centext. On the centrary, He called on us to relinquish our comfort and security - to lose ourselves in doing for others. If one studies the life of Jesus, one finds that in every case, in every instance Jesus sided with the poor, the suffering - those who were hated by society. Never did He side with the wealthy (remember the story of Jesus and the rich man) or the comfortable.

I can only construe this latest response to my articles as an example of the Watergate mentality which seems to pervade the American scene today. President Nixon said, in essence, that it is time to forget about Watergate and get on with the business of governing this nation. This sounds quite like my classmates' collective statement which was alluded to earlier. They hope that "this controversy has run its course and we will get down to the business of spending the next three years together" (curiously, Nixon also has three more years to spend with us also, unless he gets his just desserts): Well, I'm sorry to disappoint you, gang, but I'm not going to stand by and allow the scandal which is threatening the church, but it is doubtful - if not impossible - to suppose that He would condone the nationalistic "Christian" church of America which supports a government based on fascism, lies, and violence against the oppressed and suffering in this country and most of the rest of the world which America owns. The majority of the people in this country consider themselves to be Christians, and yet they stand by and allow the government, and the church as it supports the system, to continue to commit atrocities against the poor of this country and the Third World.

Why do I keep harping on these moral issues? You, friends, are the future leaders of the church in this country regardless of the positions you take. You will help to decide the future course of the church as it confronts the world and its people and institutions. Are you going to lead your people in the paths of comfort, happiness, and pseudo-spirituality, damning them under the judgment of authentic Christianity as taught to us by Jesus Christ; or, are you going to become aware and subsequently make others aware of the true situation in America - the decadence and perversity of the nationalistic "Christian" church of America (not God) - and strive to lead people to take action to change the situation? Hundreds of millions of poor and oppressed people are awaiting your decision. But be forewarned! If you make the wrong decision, you must then take responsibility for the consequences of a revolution which in all probability will result in the destruction of this country - materially, physically, and, perhaps, spiritually as well. The choice is yours! Choose this day whom you shall serve - God or Comfort. All power to Jesus Christ to triumph over the mediocrity of the church!

UNDER THE CHEF'S HAT

"KAASSTOKJES" (Cheese Sticks)

1호 cups grated Gouda cheese 1-3/4 sticks butter, softened 1 egg yolk teaspoon salt 1½ teaspoons Worcestershire sauce 3 cups flour

Combine 3/4 cup cheese and all the remaining ingredients and mix until well blended. Wrap dough in wax paper and refrigerate for 2 hours. Roll the dough out to a 4 inch thickness and cut into strips 3 inches long and $\frac{1}{4}$ inch wide. Coat the sticks with the remaining grated cheese and arrange them on a buttered cookie sheet. Bake in a preheated oven at 400° for 15 minutes. Makes 50-60 sticks.

NOW AND/OR HOW? Plan with imagination!

NOW is the time to redesign the package you're putting together as your professional preparation.

Three years of sitting in classes will not do it (no matter how brilliant they are). Not even if you do all the assigned reading and all the extra reading and understand all mysteries and all knowledge.

Why wait until after graduation to answer and satisfy those nagging vocational questions -- Is this for me? Can I do it? Where are my talents needed? Think about including in your curriculum some other, exciting components.

Like:

a summer or two or three of experimental ministry 1

AND/OR an "involvement year" (after your first year at LTS) working in some specialized ministry to help you discover your strengths and interests²

AND/OR an "intern year" (after two years at LTS) to test your understanding and practice of your vocation3

AND/OR a year in the parish training program instead of your middler year4

AND/OR a variety of practical, regular involvement experiences in different ministries as parttime jobs, as a place to supplement, experiment with and apply your Seminary learnings, as another way of getting started now in your life work⁵

AND/OR a month away from campus in January to try your wings someway (where)

AND/OR transfer to another institution for a part of your experiential and academic preparation

AND/OR

...

HOW?

Don't be satisfied with your present understanding of the available possibilities. Challenge the system. Demand that your peculiar needs be met. Make your collegium (or your adviser or the dean or the president or the director of field education or the director of vocational planning or yourself) function to help you to discover all the options and to plan how best to develop your skills and insights for faithful response to your call.
