## Supply list for **Going in Circles** workshop

**Instructor: Dawn White, First Light Designs**

**Sunday, Jan. 13, 2019 • 1 – 4 pm**

First I'll show you an amazing freezer paper method of making beautiful inset circles – no special ruler needed and no pinning of concave and convex seams! This is the method I use in my wall hanging/table runner patterns, *Full Moon Rising* and *Full Moon Rising II*.

I'll also show you an easy technique for finished-edge appliqué circles using fusible interfacing and a quick way to make raw-edge appliqué circles using Steam-a-Seam-2, a double-stick fusible web.

Handouts are provided for all three techniques.

Skill level: confident beginner

### **Fabric requirements (scraps are fine!)**

For set-in circle: two 7" squares of contrasting cotton fabric

For finished-edge appliqué circles: two 7" squares of contrasting cotton fabric

For raw-edged appliqué circles: two 7" squares of contrasting cotton fabric

### **Sewing Supplies**

Sewing machine with  $\frac{1}{4}$ " foot or other open-toed foot

Standard sewing supplies (scissors, straight pins, measuring tape, etc.)

Rotary cutting equipment: large mat, rotary cutter, rulers short and long

Pinking shears

Paper scissors

Basting (*not* permanent) glue stick. I recommend Collins or Avery brand.

Lightweight fusible interfacing, such as Pellon 911FF or 906F:  $\frac{1}{4}$  yd

Steam-a-Seam-2 [not lite]: (1) 9" x 12" sheet or  $\frac{1}{4}$  yd if buying by the yard

Non-permanent marking pens or pencils

Freezer paper (plastic coated, available at the grocery store)

Old hand towel or piece of unbleached muslin @ 18" square

\*Olfa rotary circle cutter

Optional: spray starch or alternative, such as Mary Ellen's Best Press (unscented, please)

Optional: iron and portable ironing surface

*\*Strictly speaking, this is not required, as it is possible to cut circles with scissors. I will demonstrate both methods in class.*
