April Theme Prayer: The Practice of Vulnerability

Introduction

People pray for different reasons, and the nature of prayer differs among different religions. For example, Orthodox Jews pray thanks to God for almost everything, whereas Buddhists practice no Western equivalent of prayer. For we Unitarian Universalists, prayer spans the spectrum from an intimate communication with the imminent God/Divine to total non-belief and non-practice. Each of us chooses how or whether we pray.

We gain insight into the *relationship between prayer and vulnerability* by examining their etymologies:

<u>prayer (n.)</u>: c. 1300, from Old French prier "prayer, petition, request" (12c., Modern French prière), from Medieval Latin precaria "petition, prayer," noun use of Latin adjective precaria, fem. of precarius "obtained by prayer, given as a favor," from precari "to ask, beg, pray." <u>vulnerable</u> (adj.): vulnerable capable of being wounded or hurt; susceptible to criticism or persuasion or temptation. From Late Latin: vulnerābilis ("injurious, wounding"), from Latin vulnerō ("I wound").

This relationship, of prayer and vulnerability, most clearly applies to the type of prayer that asks for help or healing from hurt/harm or protection from danger. But there are different types of prayers, broadly categorized as:

Please, Thank you, I'm Sorry, I love you, and Hear my grief/angst.

- 1. *Please*: Petition: Asks for something to be done, a cry for help.
- 2. *Thank you*: Gratitude: Thankfulness for a good outcome, whether seen as a deserved reward or windfall gain (God's Grace).
- 3. *I'm sorry*: Contrition: Statement of guilt/responsibility and request for forgiveness. This is often accompanied by a promise of some sacrifice/offering to pay for the harm or to expiate the sin.
- 4. *Adoration*: Expression of love and praise for the Divine. This might be inspired by Gratitude (cf. 2, above) or could be a spontaneous feeling.
- 5. *Grief/Angst*: lamentation: This passionate expression of pain and deep sorrow is also a form of prayer, a voice that contains the sense of rejection and is rooted in an unfulfilled expectation. Psalm 74, for example.

As prayers, these *emotional expressions* are most often addressed to a transcendent being or power that can provide what the individual offering prayer cannot do for him or herself. Whether that *prayer* is directed to some abstract concept of God (*Spirit of Life*) or to a symbolic representation (an icon or an idol), it still positions the one praying as less powerful than that being prayed to, and in that sense it marks the *vulnerability* of the praying person.

Prayer can be offered by an individual praying for herself/himself or as Prayers of (and for) the Community, recited by all or by a leader on behalf of an assembled congregation. (The use of "Amen" arose as the Jewish response to the blessing or benediction offered by the prayer leader, and is the congregational affirmation of that blessing; *May it be so*.)

Questions for discussion and discernment on your own or with others:

1. Is prayer a regular part of your life? Was it ever? Do you feel awkward or hesitant about praying? Why?

2. What circumstances in your life seem beyond your control? What would make it possible for you to approach those circumstances with renewed energy, creativity, trust and love? *UU Minister Rev Ashley Horan*

3. What first comes to your mind when you hear the word "vulnerable"? Describe a time when you felt vulnerable. How did you respond to that feeling?

4. Is it difficult for you to ask for what you need, to talk about how you're feeling, or to have the "hard conversations"? Are those difficulties mirrored in difficulty with "prayer"? If so, why do you think those things are difficult for you?

5. Describe someone you know whom you consider to be a whole person. Is it possible to be whole without being vulnerable?
