Big projects and community involvement

At the December meeting of the Detroit refinery's Community Advisory Panel (CAP), Refinery Manager Dave Roland provided the 26 attendees an update on performance and major projects at the refinery, and Community Relations Coordinator Tiffany Jones gave highlights of the refinery's involvement in helping the community throughout 2016.

Operations and projects update

Roland noted that the refinery had two recordable injuries during October and November — one contractor and one employee. "That brings our recordable injuries to 11 for the year so far," said Roland. "Our goal is always to have zero injuries, and so we are looking at our operations to determine why we have had more injuries this year than last year, and how we keep driving this number toward zero."

From an environmental standpoint, the refinery had four designated environmental incidents in 2016, compared to three in 2015, and six in each of the previous two years.

The refinery is working on its project to produce lower-sulfur gasoline, as required by the Environmental Protection Agency's "Tier 3" rule. Detailed engineering for the project will be done in April, and construction will be complete in fall of 2018.

Four liquefied petroleum gas (LPG) tanks have been placed as part of a project to move the refinery's LPG storage to a safer location on refinery property (see photo at right). Four more tanks will be added. The project is scheduled to be complete this fall.

The refinery's flare currently located at Schaffer and Dix will be eliminated, and the pipes that used to be routed to that flare will be routed to another flare in the refinery. That project is scheduled to be complete in fall of 2018.

Jones told the group that the refinery's goal for 2017 is that employees participate in at least 10 community activities throughout the year, and will also work on increasing the facility's visibility — as well as awareness about our industry — to metro Detroit youth.

Jones noted highlights of the refinery's 2016 contributions to the community, including:

- Marathon employees' pledges and corporate donation to the United Way for Southeast Michigan reached more than \$163,000, significantly exceeding the refinery's goal of \$110,000.
- The refinery provided the fuel for one of the Salvation Army's Bed and Bread trucks, as well as for "Harrison," a smaller version of the truck that delivers free food to school kids.
- Employees held a collection drive for Mark Twain School that provided crayons, notebooks, pencils, tissues and more, to make the kids' and teachers' year smoother.
- The refinery also donated fun kits to help get Mark Twain kids of various ages interested in science, technology, engineering and math.
- The company fought breast cancer through support of the Susan G. Komen Race for the Cure, the American Cancer Society, and the Karmanos Cancer Center.
- The community Halloween Party that Marathon sponsored at Rollercade was a huge success, drawing so many kids that everyone took off their roller skates and turned the event into a dance.
- The refinery sponsored a free-admission day at the Michigan Science Center to celebrate the center's fourth year of operation.
- The refinery continued its offer of full-tuition scholarships to Detroit residents who wish to pursue science, technology, engineering or math degrees at local colleges. For details go to <http://www.detroitrefinery.com> and click on the "Opportunity is knocking" link.
- Refinery Environmental Specialist Treva Formby pointed out that the Marathon Gardens Wildlife Habitat is developing well, with refinery and community volunteers having planted hundreds of trees, wildflowers and other plants.
