- Understand trends influencing present and future
- Develop a shared vision with the public
- Address growth and development topics
- Identify opportunities and understand trade-offs
- Balance competing priorities



Danvers At a Glance

Population

- 28,087 people (Census 2020)
- +6.0% 2010-20 (1,600 people)

Households

- 10,652 households (ACS 2016-20)
- +3.6% 2010-20 (373 households)

Housing

- 11,763 housing units (Census 2020)
- +5.6% 2010-20 (630 units)


Overall:

67% Satisfied or Very Satisfied


→ Comparable to national average:


Change in Past Five Years: 56% Improved or Stayed About the Same








Top 3 Potential Improvements

Survey Demographics






Respondents living in Danvers less than 5 years




Respondents living in Danvers 20+ years

Draft Vision and Goals

Our Vision for the Future...

- Describes Danvers in 2030 and beyond
- Provides the overarching framework for Strategic Danvers
- Is supported by a series of goals and strategies to achieve it



Informed by Community Input

Draft Vision Statement

Danvers is a North Shore community that prizes our small-town feel, vibrant downtown, and treasured open spaces like Endicott Park while welcoming new residents. We take pride in our strong sense of community, the events that bring us together, and proactively managing change. We remain strong stewards of our physical and financial resources by growing responsibly to meet the needs of our community and provide a high quality of life for all.

Thinking About Implementation

How Do We Achieve Our Vision?

Three primary actors:

- Town of Danvers: direct action guided by Strategic Danvers plan
- Property and business owners
- Community partners



What Can the Town Do?

- Develop department work plans to focus effort on priorities
- Allocate budget to fund projects or programs
- Review zoning and regulations that guide private development and business activity
- Invite broad public participation





However, the Town is Near Its Overall Tax Levy Limit

\$50,000

Amount Town was from its \$89.74M levy limit in FY2023 (0.06%)

- Danvers has a Triple-A (AAA) bond rating and good fund balance
- The Town has adequate debt capacity-but making debt payments within budget is an issue





What Else Can the Town Do?

- Complete Strategic Danvers process to identify shared community priorities for implementation plan
- Evaluate services and programs
- Identify State and Federal funding for key initiatives
- Future consideration: conduct a Town-wide Master Plan (long-range, policy-oriented comprehensive plan)



What Can Property and Business Owners Do?

- Choose to redevelop existing properties and/or build new construction
- Locate a new business here or invest in an existing businesses
- Actions and decision-making guided by market conditions, zoning, and other regulations



What Can Community Partners Do?

- Raise awareness and promote involvement
- Advocate for issues
- Plan events and activities

Danvers is creating its first community-wide strategic plan to help navigate a period of transition which offers bot opportunities and challenges.

This planning process began in Fall 2022. It is an exciting opportunity to hear from a broad range of residents and others. Together, we'll explore topics like growth and development, quality of life, municipal services and finances, and economic diversity. We'll identify opportunities and priorities for the future, discuss tradeoffs needed to help achieve our vision, and translate these into an action plan to guide municipal decision-making. We anticipate completing the final plan by the end of 2023.
