Students will be:

- Better able to **address** the health and social needs of the impoverished
- Better able to serve their future clients
- Prepared to improve quality of care and outcomes
- Motivated to become more involved in their communities

Activity Definition

- A portrayal of the daily challenges encountered by low income families.
- A role play conducted in a large room with multi-disciplinary students organized in "families".
- Each "week" (15 minutes) the families must prioritize needs and seek resources to provide housing, food, education, transportation, and care for their family members.
- Around the perimeter of the room are the resources that the family needs in order to survive the "month" (1 hour).
