Objectives

- 2. Identify how to utilize a personal story with students, colleagues, patients, families, and community members.
- 3. Integrate the personal story into a plan to educate and empower patients, families, and caregivers to have their story heard by healthcare providers.

Define Your Target Audience

- Educational level
- Professional background
- Level of experience
- Interprofessional experience
- Cultural characteristics

Ad hoc assessment of audience



Reflection Question 1

"Is it appropriate for the learners at their level of education?"

If "no" describe what adaptations would help the story better fit your target audience.



Reflection Question 2

"Am I comfortable with these participants hearing or using my story?"

If "no" describe what adaptations to your story are necessary to fit your target audience.



Define Your Purpose

Answer the following:

- What is the educational purpose of the _____?
 (course, seminar, address, conference)
- How will you use the story to augment the purpose?

Example: (from this workshop)

To teach participants the concepts of educational storytelling so they can develop their own interprofessional story, and plan educational activity while developing a storytelling toolkit.

Objectives

- Write the educational objectives of the (course, seminar, address, conference)
- Identify objective(s) the story satisfies
- Are additional revisions to story required?

Example (from this workshop)

At the end of the workshop, the participant will be able to: Develop a personal story that includes concepts related to interprofessionalism



Activities

- Lead the student to meaningful reflection
- Should relate story back to purpose

Example (from APTA Student Conclave)

Students will collectively answer the following question: Elaborate on how each healthcare provider could have individually and the interprofessional team collaboratively contributed to improve the patient and patient's family outcomes.





Assessment

- How will you determine
 - If the students learned what you wanted them to learn
 - Students met the objective of the educational experience

Examples:

Rubric – Classroom experience Survey question – seminar participants
