Background

"3 Pillars" Curriculum Model

3 Pillar Approach

✓ UNI - content is 'profession specific' and needs to be delivered uni-professionally in each program

✓ MULTI - content is common and applicable to all professions and can be delivered to all students at once; via flexible-learning; capitalizes on efficiencies

INTER - learning is best done in inter-professional teams of students, allowing them to learn about, from and with one another in complex ethical scenarios

Developmental Process



Milestones

Designed to be a general guide towards progress of meeting the exit competencies

Represent the key concepts a student should have met by a certain time in their program of study

Created for each competency across quartiles
