

# Involvement of Patient, Family, and Faith Community Perspectives in an Interprofessional Continuing Education Series on Ethics in Healthcare



#### Background

- Incorporation of the "patient's voice" is recognized as an important part of developing high quality continuing education (CE) activities for health care providers.
- Education on healthcare ethics lends itself to incorporating the important perspectives of patients, family caregivers, and the faith community.
- The authors describe an annual series of daylong, live, interprofessional CE activities on healthcare ethics involving patient perspectives and faith community in educational planning and delivery.

2016 – Transplantation



2015 – Geriatrics



2017 – Substance Use Disorder



# **General Objectives**

- Explore healthcare ethical issues that arise in the care of patients in a given clinical area.
- Address the patient's or family's spiritual and religious beliefs in healthcare decision making.
- Identify how professionals work collaboratively to optimize patient care.

# **Planning Process**

- Activities are planned by an executive committee of CE professionals in medicine, nursing, pharmacy, and social work, as well as scholars in ethics and Jewish faith (Rabbi).
- Each year, interprofessional content experts and faith leaders are convened to assist in designing the activity.
- Patients, family members and/or advocates are included as faculty presenters and panelists.
- Each activity is designed with a mixture of educational methodologies, including plenary sessions, panel discussions, simulations, and breakout sessions

#### **Evaluation Data**

- Scores of 95% agree or strongly agree were received on evaluation items related to relevance to professional work, faculty expertise, and active learning.
- Broad involvement of faith and patient perspectives supported a very effective educational experience.
