

# DISASTER DAY: CREATING AN OPTIMAL INTERPROFESSIONAL CLINICAL LEARNING ENVIRONMENT THROUGH SIMULATION

### **BACKGROUND**

- Interprofessional education (IPE) is an accreditation standard for most health science disciplines
- Today's healthcare providers need to be able to respond to mass casualty events
  - o Simulation is the only way to recreate such an event in a safe and effective manner
  - o Simulation can provide an effective IPE platform and environment
- Texas A&M's Disaster Day (DD) is the nation's largest student-led interprofessional emergency response simulation
- DD has occurred annually in College Station, TX since 2008
- The event was created in response to training gaps identified after Hurricanes Katrina and Rita
- DD 2018 was the first event that was intentionally interprofessional in all aspects of planning and execution
- Students from medicine, nursing, pharmacy, public health, and veterinary medicine planned and implemented event with interprofessional faculty oversight
- Students were located at multiple sites across the state

## **DESIGN**

- Faculty Planning Committee
  - Planning began in August for simulation day in February
  - Attended Train-the-Trainer Interprofessional Faculty Development Program (T3-IFDP), with a focus on restructuring DD to engender greater interprofessionalism
  - Mapped event activities to IPEC competencies, accreditation standards, and entrustable professional activities
  - Recruited additional faculty to oversee training and to conduct DD evaluation with student volunteers
  - Supervised/mentored Student Planning Committee
- Student Planning Committee
  - 60 students from participating colleges
  - Subcommittees: administration, finance, PR/media, case development and training, volunteers, supplies, and moulage



Engaged in event planning and simulation day organization

- Developed simulation and designation of student participant roles
  - 3 simulation sites established for enhancing realism of primary disaster
    - Train wreck for extraction and triage
    - Field hospital for acute patient care
    - Operations command center
- Recruited student participants for simulation day
- Participated in DD as mock patients, providers, or incident command

#### RESULTS

650 students participated + 70 faculty/staff volunteers in DD simulation

#### **CONCLUSIONS**

• DD 2018 demonstrated that simulation could provide

an ideal IPE environment

 Texas A&M is creating an interprofessional emergency response team that will

incorporate DD as part of team training

- Student feedback was positive and DD 2019 will build on feedback
- DD 2019 will include other health disciplines through partnerships with community colleges (local EMS programs)
- DD met many IPE accreditation standards but there is room for refinement

### **LESSONS LEARNED**

- It is possible to repurpose an established activity with intentional IPE
- Planning should begin sooner to accommodate the logistical challenges of such a massive event
- Campus diversity was good in committee composition but leadership needs to be local
- TeamSTEPPS provides a common language
- Mapping is part of Plan–Do– Check-Adjust (PDCA) Quality Management to ensure students graduate

team ready

- On October 1, 2017 there was a mass shooting in Las Vegas. Nicole Mancuso, an A&M graduate, was working in the ER.
  - "It was complete chaos....you have to stay calm in these situations, for the sake of the patient. At the College of Nursing, I was involved in Disaster Day, where the simulation taught me how to appropriately triage in cases of mass casualty and how to treat patients properly" \*
