Writing Concepts Pathways

Pathway	Part	Will support students with...
Introductory Paragraphs	Parts 2, 3, and 4	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• using a strong hook to start an essay• effectively connecting a hook to a thesis statement• using specific and concise language
Thesis Statements	Parts 2 and 3	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• using concise, clear, and specific language
Topic Sentences	Part 1 (except first topic)	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• using topic sentences that support the thesis and are not redundant• using concise, clear, and specific language
Body Paragraphs: Embedding Evidence	All	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• using and explaining strong evidence• providing strong source information and reporting verbs for evidence• paraphrasing evidence without plagiarizing• knowing when a sentence needs a citation and using the rules of MLA citation• adjusting pronouns and verb tenses in direct quotations to maintain parallelism
Body Paragraphs: Transition Words and Phrases	All	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• using transition words and phrases to effectively link ideas
Conclusion Paragraphs	All	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• writing a strong restatement of the thesis• writing a strong “So What?” Statement

Grammar & Conventions Pathways

Pathway	Will support students with...
Active and Passive Voice	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• using active voice to make writing more direct and clear
Appositive Phrases	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• using appositives to explain ideas, terms, or context
Building Compound and Complex Sentences	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• building sentences with varied structures properly
Capitalizing and Formatting Titles	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• correctly capitalizing titles of literary and film sources (<i>Literary Analysis only</i>)
Commas for Clarity	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• using commas to make writing clear
Lists	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• using correct punctuation with items in a series
MLA Citation I	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• implementing the rules of MLA for in-text citations
Misplaced and Dangling Modifiers	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• placing modifiers correctly to create descriptive sentences
Parallel Structure	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• maintaining parallelism to help writing flow
Restrictive and Nonrestrictive Clauses	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• adding description and detail to their writing
Vague Pronouns	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• using clear pronouns
