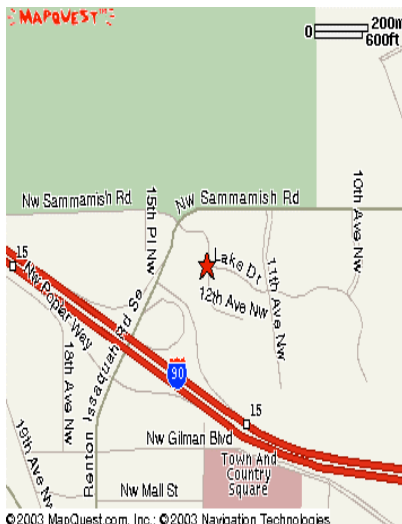

Program Description

This one-day program is designed to review the most recent Social Worker Code of Ethics, address ethical issues occurring in the dialysis center surrounding mental health and end of life in addition to talking with patients regarding adherence. For the first time we will Live Stream this event.

Learning Objectives

- Describe the ethical standards outlined in the Social Worker Code of Ethics and how it applies to the dialysis setting.
- Outline the revisions to the Code of Ethics and how it influences the Social Worker practice in the dialysis setting
- Recognize the most common symptoms and exacerbations of mental health disorders facing nephrology patients.
- Identify how mental health symptoms can be heightened and may alter during end-of-life periods, consistent with “End Stage Renal Disease” (ESRD).
- Identify the impact of mental health disorders and ESRD can impact at-home dialysis and in-clinic dialysis outcomes and determine ways for staff to support and effectively manage these concerns.
- Identify key Ethical Decision-Making considerations around deciding to continue or discontinue ESRD treatment when patient capacity is impacted by psychosis, dementia, brain injury, or other serious mental health and/or cognitive impairment(s).
- Recognize additional Ethical Decision-Making challenges for clinical staff and the patient’s other support persons (personal or paraprofessional support) in lieu of the complex concerns at the intersection of ESRD and a patient nearing their end-of-life; with a focus on empathy and quality of life measures.
- Actively participate in case examples where complex Ethical Decision Making were evident and to think critically, yet supportively, at as many of the possible implications of continuing or discontinuing a patient’s treatment in lieu of multiple cognitive, emotional, physical, social, and other quality of life issues.
- Discuss and explore the difference between patient compliance and patient adherence.
- Discuss and review patient non-adherence in the ESRD population.
- Examine depression as it relates to ESRD population.

- Identify successful strategies in working with patients towards positive outcomes.
- Identify and discuss how communication impacts patient perceptions and adherence.
- Discuss strategies in working toward positive outcomes when dealing with difficult cases.
- Identify ways that social work staff can be effectively used to resolve difficult cases.
