IRRIGATE LAWNS WITH CARE

It has been observed that in some instances lawns are being watered excessively, causing damage to the grass, plants and waste of water.

Three good irrigations per week are considered sufficient for grass that is large enough to cut. Since soil conditions vary, no universal rule on watering can be given, but irrigations should be just frequent enough to keep the grass in a healthy growing condition. Excessive water causes a soil condition which retards the growth of grass.

The sprinkler should remain in one spot just long enough to soak the top soil. If water is running off the lawn, the water is being applied faster than the soil is absorbing it, and the flow must be reduced or the sprinkler moved to another spot. With proper irrigation, no run-off of water should occur.

Newly seeded lawns should be sprinkled by hand as needed to keep the top soil moist at all times. Heavy, unattended water results in erosion of the soil and washes out young grass plants.
