It's serious, now—a question whether or not the present power plants will be able to handle the

Let's all do our part. Most of us have sons, daughters, husbands or other close relatives in the armed services. This is one more thing we can do to help them home just that much sooner.

The following suggestions are of-fered by L. W. White of the Real Estate office . . . follow them, and conserve electricity!

1. Only use lights in occupied

2. When leaving a room and the light is not needed, be sure its off.
3. When outside lighting is necessary, be sure to turn it off when day-

light will suffice.
4. When you have finished using any electrical appliance, be sure to turn off the power.

Obey the rules which have been set up on your job to prevent disclosure of information to those who are not entitled to it. to prevent disclosure of information to those who are not entitled to it. Report anything suspcious to your superior, or to the military intelligence office, and not to anyone else. Victory depends on the trustworthiness of those in the armed services and those working on war projects. Don't jeonardize to be

## Eligibility Rules Stressed For Disability Wage Plan

The importance of HEWers co-operating fully with the Medical Division if they are eligible and seek benefits under the du Pont Disability Wage Plan was stressed this

It was pointed out that du Pont employees with a year or more of service are eligible for the plan which provides continued income for a period not to exceed 13 weeks, and less a waiting period of two days and the fractional part of the day on which injury occurred, for injuries and illness not resulting from occupational

The disability must not have been self-inflicted or owing to will-ful misconduct. Illness and injury resulting from one's occupation is covered by state workmen's com-

pensation laws.

An employee coming under the plan must report his absence by telephone, in person, or by mail to experience the West's proof telegram to the Absentee Clerk in the Time Office within three days, giving his name, badge number, address, the nature of disabilname and address of the attending physician, the date taken ill, and the approximate time he will be off work.

Th employee also must be attended by a regularly licensed physician, and he must remain at his local address or in the vicinity of the plant unless given permission to leave by the Medical Division. Full cooperation with the Medical Division is a pre-requisite to eligiblity for benefts under the

### Waste Paper Collection Has Started

To help relieve the critical shortage of paper which exists in many parts of the country, a paper sal-vage campaign has been started throughout the Project.

There are many paper mills throughout this section of the country, some of which have had to shut down temporarily because of a shortage of raw materials, par-ticularly waste papre. The War Pro-duction Board urges everyone to cooperate in this campaign to the fullest extent.

Regularly scheduled pick-ups of newspapers, magazines, kraft and manila wrapping paper and cartons will be made. Office paper is not the type needed.

Barracks residents are asked to give their contributions to the janitors or maids. Trailer camp residents should turn theirs in at two bins, one near the boiler house at bins, one near the boiler nouse at the school building and the other at the camp office. The hours for this will be Monday, Wednesday, and Friday between 10 and 12 a.m. and 4 to 6 p.m. Collections will be made from homes and commercial establishments in Richland every Tuesday. There will also be pickups from the mess halls and later, in the construction areas.

#### Your Tax Problems BY WALTER J. ARIES

As announced previously, our office in the Hanford Housing building will be open until 10 o'clock every evening except Saturday and Sunday to help you with your Income Tax problems or any other come Tax problems or any other questions you may have. Due to the fact that only one man will be expenses of the dance. Remember on duty in the evenings, we cannot help everyone to complete the re-turns at this time, but this service will be available during the filing period from February 14 to 24.

Among the many inquiries we are receiving, one question often asked is the proper method of handling the wages earned by dependents under 18 years of age. If the wages amount to more than \$500 it is correct for the dependent to file a separate return, which will usually result in a refund of tax. When such a separate return is filed, the parent does not take credit for this dependent. However, if the wages earned are less than \$500, the parent adds this amount to his own income, and takes credit for the dependent and also for the amount withheld on the dependent's wages.

Another question asked is where to file the return. If a taxpayer has his home established in another state and intends to return there to live later, he may file his return there if he wishes. However if a taxpayer has moved his family to the state of Washington and does not have any reason to consider himself a resident of some other state, he may be able to effect a saving in his tax by filing as a resident of Washington. This state is one of several having community property laws, which this saving possible. More detailed information on this may be had by contacting this office. Our phone number is Hanford 8537.
